# ReggieCon Live! 2024 Ruins, Reflections, Creations, and Dreams Project Report

Contemporary life is full of change: AI, Racial Reckoning, The Covid pandemic, Global Warming. All of these events can generate a sense of uncertainty that signals dystopian catastrophe for some, while promising long-awaited possibilities for others. ReggieCon was created in the fall of 2020 to be a forum for discussions and interactions geared toward directly addressing these ambiguities. And ReggieCon Live 2024: Ruins, Reflections, Creations, and Dreams was created to be a means for the Illinois State University community to culturally capture, discuss, and celebrate the seemingly intractable chaos of our time.

ReggieCon Live 2024 took place from Saturday, April 27th through Tuesday, April 30th and occurred at different campus locations at different times. Over 500 faculty, students, staff, and members of the general public attended 13 different events organized by ReggieCon Live! 2024, including three, multi-hour, student creativity showcases on Saturday, a one-day conference titled, "At the Ruins of Contemporary Culture: What Will Tomorrow's Minds Say about Today's Selves?" on Sunday, and multiple classroom presentations, panels, and workshops on Monday and Tuesday. 








Over 30 students sat in on two separate music classes with recording artist / composer Noah Earle. The lectures were organized by Professor Matthew Smith.







# The Necker-Zeno Model for Bistable Perception Dr. Harald Atmanspacher Physicist, ETH Zurich, Switzerland







This talk discusses how mathematical structures well known in physics can be viably applied to mental phenomena, such as the perception of bistable stimuli. A basic formal feature of this novel framework for psychology is the noncommutativity of operations acting on mental states. A corresponding model for bistable perception, the Necker-Zeno model, is derived and experimental evidence for it is described. It is also discussed how temporal Bell inequalities are violated by the model, predicting a temporal nonlocality of mental states which is experienced as a finite extension of nowness between past and future.






