## Lien takes the helm of a sinking ship

It's official! Dave Buss is out and Dick Lien is in as head basketball coach at UWGB.

UWGB officials made the announcement at a press conference April 9 amidst speculation that Buss would not be retained as coach.

Lien, who has been Buss's assistant the past two seasons, becomes only the second head coach in the 13 year history of Phoenix basketball.

Buss, who still has two years remaining on his contract will be reassigned to a department degree in physical education at Minnesota. Record 22-4. His Moorhead (Minnesota) State. team averaged close to 90 Earned his Master's degree in special education and physical education at St. Cloud (Minnesota) State.

- Married. Wife's name Loretta. Three children.

 Coached two years at Clarissa (Minnesota) High School. Enrollment 400.Record unavailable.

 Five years head coach at Monticello (Minnesota) High School. Enrollment 600. Record 48-33.

- June 1980, was named assistant coach at UWGB.

Lien doesn't view his first head coaching position at Division I level as a revolutionary change.

"Coaching is basically coaching at every level. I don't want to oversimplify things but the game is almost exactly the same regardless of the level," said Lien.

"It all comes down to preparation, hard work, alot of discipline and dedication," he said.

"Those type of things are all applicable whichever level your on be it — the pro's, Division I or Division II, junior college or high school. "So the idea about it being a revolutionary change coming into this position, I can't perceive that."

Lien feels good about his returning talent.

"We got ten kids back, nine who were on this year's team, one who was redshirted (that being Danny Theighs) who all have marketable skills at our level of basketball," said Lien.

According to Lien, the timing of his appointment had only slightly damaged their recruiting efforts. "The fact that a new coach from outside

did not come in was an advantage," said Lien.

"The fact that there was a period in there where our continuity of recruiting was interrupted at a very important time in the recruitment process, right near signing date, did not have a positive affect but at the same time it was unavoidable."

"Basically our recruiting is state intact despite the change," said Lien.

Lien revolves his coaching philosophy around "all out effort all the time."

"I don't think it's asking too much for a young man whose on full scholarship, getting his education paid for to be on time and to work hard when he's at practice and in a game," said Lien.

"I will be emphasizing and reemphasizing the commitment to hard work because if

you work hard you become the best basketball player you


"If you get into the habit of working hard you won't know how to loaf," he said.

Lien compares challenges of UWGB's Division I effort to the old crawl, walk, run cycle.

"We've been very successful as a Division II university, a N.A.I.A. university and now we are in the infant stages of the Division I climb."

"We certainly want to climb to a situation where we are vying for national exposure. However, we are at a position now where we are in a crawl position. Before you can run you've got to walk," said Lien.

"We want to keep improving the skill level of our team and also capture the entertainment fancy of our community," added Lien.
