

(Assistant Professor) The Department of African American Studies at Princeton University has selected Mari N. Crabtree to be an Associate Research Scholar for the 2019–2020 academic year. She will spend next year revising her book manuscript, My Soul is a Witness: Lynching and Southern Memory, 1940-1970, which is under contract with the New Directions in Narrative History Series at Yale University Press. The postdoctoral fellowship will also support research for her next book project, which explores subterfuge and deception as strategies for critiquing white supremacy within the African American protest tradition. In addition to participating in colloquia, seminars, and lectures sponsored by Princeton's Department of African American Studies, she will deliver a public lecture on her research.


(Adjunct Instructor) was appointed Senior Fellow at the Global Social Justice Practice Academy at Ohio University.

Olivia is a Cultural History Interpretive Aide at McLeod Plantation Historic Site in Charleston, South Carolina where she interprets the history of slavery. She began her career at McLeod in 2016 and while there, became a Certified Interpretive Guide through the National Association of Interpretation. Olivia Williams plans to pursue a Master of Arts degree in Public History here at the College of Charleston beginning this fall. She will also intern at the Avery Research Center for African American History and Culture.

AAST in Jamaica!



A group of 10 students participated in Study Abroad Program offered by AAST in June. Students traveled to Montego Bay, Jamaica to study the distinct history and culture of the African Diaspora through the lens of music. They spent a week immersed in cultural environs that gave birth to Reggae. Here is what students had to say about their experience:

"The highlight of this trip was visiting the Indigenous Rastafari Village. In this village, the indigenous people had all of the College of Charleston students join their ensemble. We sat together--different colors, ethnicities, and cultures--but we learned there in the Rasta village in Jamaica, that different rhythms mean nothing. The power comes when these rhythms come together and make harmony."
