


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IU Marching Hundred: High School Band Day


Band Day 2022 - September 10, 2022

Homecoming Weekend 2022

Homecoming 2022 was a special weekend in Bloomington. Not only did we welcome back our Alumni Band, which was 200 strong, we also welcomed back almost 200 Alumni RedSteppers to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of their first season in 1972. Friday night began with the second annual Alumni Band performance on the steps of Hundred Hall before the Homecoming Parade. The Alumni Band had a great time as did the spectators! The Marching Hundred joined in the Homecoming Parade on what was a beautiful Friday evening. After the parade, we held a RedStepper 50th Anniversary Banquet in the DeVault Alumni Center. The evening was full of special speakers including members of the original 1972 RedSteppers, Laura Roth, the daughter of RedStepper founder Karen Bailey, former director Janis Cooper-Parker, and current director Brookelyn Wood. Former Marching Hundred directors Ray Cramer and Stephen Pratt also shared some thoughtful memories about their RedStepper experiences over the years.

We started early on Saturday morning with a business meeting and rehearsal with the Alumni Band at 7am. The Alumni Band performed two Dave Woodley arrangements that featured our Alumni Flag Corps during Pregame: Start Me Up, conducted by Ray Cramer, and Cheeseburger In Paradise, conducted by Stephen Pratt. The Alumni Band also played in the stands, which seemed to help the Hoosiers stay close to Michigan in the first half. During Halftime, almost 200 RedSteppers danced in smaller groups with the Marching Hundred in a 50th Anniversary themed show designed by Dr. Tiffany Galus. The show ended with another Dave Woodley arrangement, Get It On, with 200 Alumni Band members joining the Marching Hundred and almost 200 RedSteppers joining for a goal line to goal line kick line! It was an exciting and special show that the crowd loved to see.

We held a Celebration of Life for Dave Woodley on Saturday night, which featured guest speakers, including Mr. Woodley's son Darin Woodley. The speeches were a great mixture of sentiment and humor. The highlight of the evening was the Alumni Pep Band that assembled to read through several classic Dave Woodley arrangements. Many remarked that it was a special time and that it brought back a flood of memories from their time with Mr. Woodley. We are so glad that so many joined us for a special tribute to the dearly missed former director of the Marching Hundred, Dave Woodley. We look forward to many more Alumni Band events in the future!

IDEAS FROM THE PODIUM

Four Emerging Composers for Band to Be Aware of

The landscape of the repertoire for wind bands/ensembles has been an intriguing one for its relatively young history (compared to that of the orchestra) but has been perhaps especially exciting and innovative in the last twenty years or so. To name just a few, long-established composers for the medium such as Warren Benson, Karel Husa, Frank Ticheli, Ron Nelson, and David Maslanka seem to have inspired in part a wave of composers for band in the twenty-first century to write many outstanding additions to the repertoire. Certainly, any discussion of a "Canon" of pieces that can be regarded as the best or most representative of the band medium is, at best, inescapably rife with pitfalls and assumptions based on subjective opinion, and at worst, heavily influenced by systemic issues of access, equity, and representation of historically marginalized groups. This being said, the band medium has seen an outstanding influx of new and innovative works by composers that (at least I feel) will positively impact the repertoire for many years to come. For this brief article, I humbly share information about four of these composers and suggestions for recommended listening below.



Viet Cuong (b. 1990)

Called "alluring" and "wildly inventive" by The New York Times, the music of American composer Viet Cuong has been performed on six continents by musicians and ensembles such as the New York Philharmonic, Eighth Blackbird, Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Sō Percussion, Alarm Will Sound. Atlanta Symphony, Sandbox Percussion, Albany Symphony, PRISM Quartet, and Dallas Winds, among many others. Viet's music has been featured in venues such as Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, and the Kennedy Center, and his works for wind ensemble have amassed hundreds of performances worldwide. Passionate about bringing these different facets of the contemporary music community together, his upcoming projects include a concerto for Eighth Blackbird with the United States Navy Band. Viet also enjoys exploring the unexpected and whimsical, and he is often drawn to projects where he can make peculiar combinations and sounds feel enchanting or oddly satisfying

Carrollton, Georgia native, Katahi Copley (he/him/his) premiered his first work, Spectra, in 2017 and hasn't stopped composing since. As of 2017, Katahi has written over 100 works, including pieces for chamber ensembles, large ensembles, wind ensembles, and orchestra. His compositions have been performed and commissioned by universities, organizations, and professional ensembles. including the Cavaliers Brass, Carroll Symphony Orchestra, California Band Director Association, Admiral Launch Duo, and the Atlanta Wind Symphony. Katahi has also received critical acclaim internationally with pieces being performed in Canada, the United Kingdom, Japan, China, and Australia. Katahi received two Bachelor of Music degrees from the University of West Georgia in Music Education and Composition in 2021. He is currently studying composition with Omar Thomas at the University of Texas at Austin. Aside from composing, Katahj is an excited educator who teaches young musicians the joy of discovering music and why music is a phenomenal language.

Katahi Copley (b. 1998)



Nicole Piunno is a composer who views music as a vehicle for seeing and experiencing the realities of life. Her music often reflects the paradoxes in life and how these seeming opposites are connected as they often weave together. Her harmonic language and use of counterpoint mirrors the complexity of our world by acknowledging light and dark, past and present, beauty and brokenness, confinement and freedom, chaos and order, spiritual and physical, life and death. Nicole holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in composition and a Master of Music degree in theory pedagogy from Michigan State University. Her composition teacher was Ricardo Lorenz. She earned a Master of Music degree in composition at Central Michigan University, studying with David Gillingham. Nicole earned a Bachelor of Music degree in Music Education and her emphasis was on trumpet. Her music has been performed by the Principal Brass Quintet of the New York Philharmonic, Athena Brass Band, The United States Coast Guard Band, Wind Symphony of Clovis, the University of North Texas Wind Ensemble, and at many other universities and conservatories around the country.

Nicole Piunno (b. 1985) Kevin Day (b. 1996)



An American whose music has been characterized by "propulsive, syncopated rhythms, colorful orchestration, and instrumental virtuosity," (Robert Kirzinger, Boston Symphony) composer Kevin Day has quickly emerged as one of the leading young voices in the world of music composition today, whose music ranges from powerful introspection to joyous exuberance. Kevin Day is an internationally acclaimed composer, conductor, and pianist, whose music often intersects between the worlds of jazz, minimalism, Latin music, fusion, and contemporary classical idioms. A winner of the BMI Student Composer Award, a three-time finalist for the ASCAP Morton Gould Young Composer Award, and considered for the 2022 Pulitzer Prize for his Concerto for Wind Ensemble, Day has composed over 200 works, and has had numerous performances throughout the United States, Russia, Austria, Australia, Taiwan, South Africa, and Japan. His works have been programmed by the symphonies of Boston, San Francisco, Detroit, Indianapolis, Houston, and more, as well as several top professional and collegiate wind ensembles. His works have been performed at Carnegie Hall, Rachmaninov Hall (Russia), The Midwest Clinic, and other major venues, and recently he had his Carnegie Hall Conducting Debut at the 2022 New York International Music Festival. Day is currently Assistant Professor of Composition at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, Canada.
