

MIGHTY SOUND OF THE SOUTH PEP BAND

The University of Memphis Pep Band keeps the 18,000 cheering fans in the FedEx Forum on their feet as they cheer on the nationally ranked men's basketball team, and the women's basketball team at the on-campus Elma Roane Fieldhouse. Students in the Pep Band receive a scholarship (amount varies year-to-year), have the opportunity to travel to basketball tournaments in locations throughout the country, and are part of the rich traditions at the UofM. Past performances have included the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament and the National Invitational Tournament.

Pep Band auditions are held each fall, at the beginning of October.





UNIVERSITY OF MEMPHIS WIND ENSEMBLE

With a goal of being one of the finest ensembles of its kind, the University of Memphis Wind Ensemble is comprised of the most exceptional graduate and undergraduate instrumentalists attending the Rudi E. Scheidt School of Music. The ensemble is dedicated to delivering artistic performances that are both eloquent and meticulously prepared. The quest of the Wind Ensemble is to achieve the highest degree of professionalism possible, and to bring its audiences the finest artistic repertoire regardless of the period or style.

The Wind Ensemble is conducted by Dr. Albert Nguyen, director of bands and area coordinator for large ensembles. Performing multiple times on campus annually, the Wind Ensemble also performs on historic Memphis stages like the Levitt Shell, conferences and festivals, and frequently tours the Mid-South.

The UofM Wind Ensemble is proud of its former members who now hold positions in symphony orchestras, military bands, and collegiate faculties around the world.

How the Bands are Judged

The Bandmasters Championship utilizes the caption adjudication system. Each adjudicator concentrates on a specific area of the performance: musical, visual, percussion, guard or general effect. This format maximizes constructive commentary while providing fair and accurate comparisons among the bands.

While all elements of the marching band show are important, the Bandmasters Championship believes that the primary reason bands exist is to play music. Therefore, music (60% of score) is emphasized over visual (40% of score). We also believe that the band's performance takes priority over design or entertainment qualities, so the scoring system emphasizes performance (70%) over general effect (30%).

Each Championship Division (competitive) band receives a score based on a scale of 100 points. Eight adjudicators will contribute to the band's total score, which is used to determine ratings and placements. The adjudicators and their point allocations are as follows:

Music Ensemble: 20 points **Music Performance:** 20 points **Music Effect:** 15 points Visual Ensemble: 10 points **Visual Performance:** 10 points **Visual Effect:** 15 points **Percussion Performance:** 5 points **Color Guard Performance:** 5 points

Total: 100 points

All bands in Championship Division receive a rating. The purpose of the ratings is to give each band an absolute indication of performance quality, regardless of how it may have ranked relative to other bands. Each Championship Division band will receive a rating based on the total score. Ratings will be awarded as follows:

Superior (I) - 75.0 to 100.0 | Excellent (II) - 60.0 to 74.995 | Good (III) - 45.0 to 59.995 | Fair (IV) - Less than 45.0

Earning a Superior Rating at the Bandmasters Championship is a significant accomplishment. The rigorous judging standards of this contest are intended to be at the highest level in the region, and comparable to other major contests in the United States.

CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

The Bandmasters Championship has two divisions: Open (non-competitive) and Championship (competitive). Open Division bands receive comments from the judges, but are not scored or ranked. Championship Division bands compete for class and overall awards. The four classification systems in Championship Division are:

Small Band Classification (A) - 39 winds or less Medium Band Classification (AA) - 40-59 winds Large Band Classification (AAA) - 60-89 winds Extra Large Band Classification (AAAA) - 90 winds or more

A band may enroll in a higher classification, but not a lower one. The order of appearance in each classification was determined by draw.

Above all, each adjudicator must possess the highest level of competence and fairness and have a solid reputation among fellow music educators. The panel of adjudicators is also intended to represent a diverse geographical area. Whenever possible, adjudicators are selected from outside the vicinity of the participating bands.

VISUAL ENSEMBLE – SUSAN BASS

Susan Bass retired from Mason City Schools in 2017 following 31 years of teaching. She served as the Visual Head and Assistant Director of the six-time BOA Grand National Finalist, William Mason High School Marching Band. During her time at William Mason, her Middle School concert bands were consistently recognized, and they performed at the Music For All National Concert Band Festival, OMEA Professional Conferences, and the Bowling Green University Directors Clinic. She also had the privilege of guest conducting the William Mason Wind Symphony at the 2016 Midwest Clinic.

Prior to her years at Mason, Susan was Assistant Director at Kings Local Schools. During her tenure as the Kings Winter Guard Director, the guard was selected as the 1997 WGI Scholastic A Gold Medalist and the 1998 Scholastic Open Gold Medalist. Susan has served as a designer, instructor, and consultant for a variety of marching bands and guards throughout her years.

Susan is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music where she was Drum Major of the UC Marching Bearcats for three years. She earned a master's degree in Curriculum Development from Walden University and was the recipient of the "Celebrate Excellence Award" and the "Project Excellence Award" in Teaching. Susan holds professional memberships in the Central States Judges Association, Music Education National Association, Ohio Music Education Association, Phi Beta Mu, Sigma Alpha lota, and Tau Beta Sigma.

VISUAL PERFORMANCE INDIVIDUAL (ON FIELD) - JOE CAVALLARO

Joe started in the marching arts in 1983 as a marching member of the Patriots Drum & Bugle Corps and continued through 1996, including stops with the Crusaders, USCGA Windjammers and DCA Champion Empire Statesmen. In addition to performing with the famous Jammitors at Walt Disney World and Tokyo Disneyland, Joe taught percussion and visual for high school bands including Hilton HS, East Lyme HS, and the Williamsport Millionaires. He has been a visual judge with CSJA for the past ten years and is a current member of the contest staffs for WGI, the FFCC and FMBC.

MUSIC EFFECT - SEAN SUMWALT

Sean Sumwalt (b. 1988) is a composer, conductor and arranger from the crossroads of America, Muncie, Indiana. Sean holds a Bachelor of Music in Composition from Butler University (2012) and a Scoring for Motion Pictures and Television Graduate Certificate from The University of Southern California. (2013) Sean is a member of the Board of Directors for the Central States Judges Association (CSJA) where he serves as a music adjudicator and clinician for bands across the United States.

Since Sean began writing for film in 2008 and his works have been featured in the Heartland Film Festival, The California Independent Film Festival, The Cleveland International Film Fest, and many others. His score for *SARGE* won "Best Music in a Film" at the 2016 Reading Film Festival and has worked on the hit Netflix docu-drama series *Chef's Table*. While he was working on *Chef's Table*, the show was nominated for an Emmy two years in a row (2015-16) for Outstanding Music Composition for a Series. His score to the docu-drama *Surviving Theater 9* made its debut at the 17th Annual Tribeca Film Festival in 2018 receiving many accolades.

In 2022, Sean enjoys a diverse writing schedule, splitting his time between stage, screen, and field. He currently serves as on-staff composer and arranger for many groups in the Indiana marching band scene as well as consistently flexing his film music chops writing provocative scores for countless features and shorts. Sean currently resides in Atlanta, Georgia.



MUSIC PERFORMANCE INDIVIDUAL (ON FIELD) - LOIS WIGGINS

Lois U. Wiggins, Retired Band Director, taught for 33 years in Kentucky, Tennessee and Indiana. Bachelor of Science in Music Education from Austin Peay State University, Master of Music Education from the University of Georgia, and Rank I in Secondary Education from Western Kentucky University.

Ms. Wiggins is past Kentucky Music Educators Association State Band Chair (2015-16) and served for 10 years as Band Content Area Leader for the Fayette County Public Schools in Lexington Kentucky. Ms. Wiggins is currently Co-Conductor with the Central Kentucky Youth Repertory Orchestra and Adjunct Faculty in Music Education at Eastern Kentucky University.

Lois has guest conducted honor bands and adjudicated at concert band, marching band and solo & ensemble festivals in New York, Ohio, Tennessee, New Mexico and Kentucky and is a past performing member of the Lexington Brass Band and Evansville Symphonic Band.

Ms. Wiggins is a 2016 Grammy Music Educator Award National Finalist. Phi Beta Mu International Band Masters Fraternity recognized Lois as "Outstanding Young Band Director in Kentucky" in 1992, "Outstanding Bandmaster" in 2010 and KMEA Middle School Teacher of the year in 2000. Ms. Wiggins was inducted into the Phi Beta Mu Band Master Hall of Fame (KY) in February of 2022.

COLOR GUARD - KEN MARTINSON

In the past 39 years, Ken has been involved with literally every facet of the marching activity -- performer, instructor, event manager and judge. In 1996 he founded MARCHING.COM which is an authoritative source for marching-related events, links, resources, news and photos. The website and its social media channels provide a passionate and positive voice for the marching activity.

Ken has served on judging panels at parade and field competitions in 19 states and Canada. His work as a color guard designer for 11 years earned numerous top guard awards and brought him to distinguished events such as the Fiesta Bowl Parade and Tournament of Roses Parade. He marched with the Sky Ryders Drum & Bugle Corps and is a frequent contributor to Halftime Magazine. Ken was the force behind the Vikingland Band Festival in Alexandria, Minnesota, helping develop it into Minnesota's parade marching championship.

PERCUSSION - BRAD MEYER

Dr. Brad Meyer (www.Brad-Meyer.com) is a percussion educator, artist, and composer with an extensive and diverse background. Currently, Meyer is the Associate Professor of Percussion at Stephen F. Austin State University (Nacogdoches, TX) where he is the private lesson teacher and director of the percussion ensemble. Meyer frequently tours to universities and high schools both nationally and internationally to present recitals, workshops, masterclasses, and clinics on various topics, including: electro-acoustic percussion, contemporary marimba, concert snare drum, marching percussion, percussion ensemble, steel band, and world music. His international performances and clinics have taken him to Austria, Taiwan, France, South Africa, and Slovenia. Meyer has been an active presenter/performer at numerous festivals and conventions, including: Midwest Band & Orchestra Clinic, Texas Music Educators Association's national convention, Percussive Arts Society's International Convention, International Computer Music Conference, Society for Electroacoustic Music in the United States' Convention, New York City Electroacoustic Music Festival, Graz's (Austria) Night of Percussion, Chiayi's (Taiwan) International Band Festival, Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis's Intermedia Festival, and Transylvania University's Studio 300 Festival. Meyer is a composer with several compositions for snare drum, multi-percussion, and percussion ensemble published through Bachovich Publications, Tapspace Publications, and Ox & Lamb Publications. Meyer is a proud endorsee of Yamaha Instruments, Zildjian Cymbals, Vic Firth Sticks and Mallets, Evans Drumheads, and Tycoon Percussion.

Meyer serves as the Percussive Arts Society Texas Chapter's Vice President (TXPAS Secretary from 2014-2016), Chair of the PAS Health & Wellness Committee (Committee Member from 2013-2016), and as a past member of the PAS Technology Committee. He was the Vice President of the Kentucky Chapter of PAS in 2011–2013. Meyer was the Visiting Instructor of Music in Percussion/Percussion Ensemble Director at Centre College (Danville, KY) in 2011–2012 and was the Adjunct Professor of Percussion at Tennessee Technological University (Cookeville, TN) during the fall of 2011. Meyer completed his Doctor of Musical Arts in Percussion Performance and Pedagogy of Music Theory Certificate in the Spring of 2011 under James Campbell at the University of Kentucky, where he also graduated Summa Cum Laude with a Bachelor's Degree in Music Performance in 2006. Along with his studies at



UK, Brad was the Wildcat Marching Band's percussion director, UK Steel Band/Blue Steel coordinator, and percussion studio lesson instructor. He received his Master of Music Performance Degree under the direction of Dr. Scott Herring at the University of South Carolina, where he ran the Palmetto Pans, arranged and coordinated the USC drumline, and debuted his first percussion ensemble composition, *Your Three Favorite Colors*.

In 2010, he was the pit manager for the Blue Stars Drum and Bugle Corps, and before that he was the front ensemble caption head of the Madison Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps in 2009, where he was as a front ensemble technician for the two years prior. His extensive training in the core percussion instruments (snare drum, keyboard, timpani, drum set, multi-percussion) as well as world music, particularly on the Caribbean steel pan, Korean P'ungmul, mbira (Zimbabwe finger piano), Joropo maracas, and both Javanese and Balinese gamelan has provided a global perspective for his performances and research areas. From 2002-2005, Meyer was a part of The Cadets Drum and Bugle Corps' front ensemble, where he accumulated one world championship, three "high-drum" trophies, and three "outstanding service" awards. Dr. Meyer was born in 1983.

MUSIC ENSEMBLE - GORDON HENDERSON

Gordon Henderson is a Director of Bands and Professor Emeritus at UCLA. From 1982 to 2019, Henderson served as the director of the UCLA Bruin Marching and Varsity Band. Under Professor Henderson's direction, the Bruin Marching Band appeared at five Rose Bowls, the Fiesta Bowl, two Cotton Bowls, four Sun Bowls, three Las Vegas Bowls, the Aloha Bowl, the Freedom Bowl, the Alamo Bowl, the Cactus Bowl, and four San Francisco Bay Area bowls. In 1993, the UCLA Bruin Marching Band received the prestigious Sudler Trophy, presented by the John Philip Sousa Foundation to recognize excellence and innovation.

International trips by the Band during Henderson's tenure included the American Train Celebration in Tokyo in 1988, the Hong Kong International New Year Night Parade in 2006 and 2008, the Ekitopia Festival Parade in Nagoya, Japan in 2010 and 2018, and the 2016 Taoyuan International Band Festival in Taiwan.

Motion Picture appearances of the Band included *To Be or Not to Be* (1983), *Welcome Home, Roxy Carmichael* (1990), *Jingle All the Way* (1996), *A Bright Shining Lie* (1998), *Pumpkin* (2002), *First Daughter* (2004), and *500 Days of Summer* (2009). Television appearances included *The Betty Ford Story* TV movie (1987), *Hollywood Squares* (1988), *Hull High* (1990), *Jeopardy* (1990 and 2001), *The Computer Wore Tennis Shoes* TV movie (1995), *E-Ring* (2005), *CBS The Early Show* (2007), *The Super Bowl Pregame Show* (2008), *NBC The Today Show* (2007), *The Video Music Awards Preshow* (2014), *The Goldbergs* (2015), *Lip Sync Battle* (2016), *The Ellen DeGeneres Show* in 2016 and 2019, and *MSNBC Live with Katy Tur* (2018), as well as TV commercials for Macy's (2001), FedEx (2001), ESPN Mobile (2006), McDonald's (2011), Honda (2011), the NCAA (2013). The Band also appeared in music videos for Destiny's Child ("Bugaboo" 1999), Josh Pan and X&G ("Platinum" 2016), and Maren Morris ("Girl" 2019). Major high-profile events by the Band included opening for The Rolling Stones at Staples Center in 2013 with Henderson's arrangement of "Satisfaction," and appearing on TV in the premiere episode of *The Amazing Race, Season 24*, in 2014. Henderson wrote the marching band arrangement of "Pressure" by the English alternative rock group MUSE that was included as a bonus version of the song in the Super Deluxe edition of the album *Simulation Theory*, which was released in November 2018.

From 1989 to 1996, Professor Henderson directed the Jazz Ensemble I, performing with numerous guest artists including Roy Hargrove, Bob Mintzer, Brad Goode, Kenny Burrell, Conte Candoli, Matt Catingub, Bill Watrous, Steve Houghton, Snooky Young, Gerald Wilson, and Paquito D'Rivera. Under his direction, both the Jazz Ensemble I and the Jazz Combo won their respective divisions at the 1995 Reno International Jazz Festival. Henderson also conducted the Jazz Ensemble II from 1989 to 2002.

Henderson's other duties at UCLA included serving as Vice Chair of the Music Department for 15 years, conducting the Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Band, and teaching courses in conducting, music theory, band arranging, marching band drill design, and music technology. Henderson's university service included the Undergraduate Council, where he served as the Chair of the Academic Senate Program Review for the Department of Psychology, as Chair of the Honors, Awards, & Prizes Committee, and as the faculty representative for the Student Fee Advisory Committee and the Undergraduate Students Association Council.

Since 1991, Henderson has served as the Arranger for the Tenrikyo Aimachi Marching Band in Nagoya, Japan, the eleven-time All-Japan National Champions, and since 2007, he has served as the Arranger for the Illusion Magic Drum and Bugle Corps from Toyota City, Japan. He served as a clinician and drill designer for the Taiwan International Band Clinic in 2000. In Thailand, Henderson has worked with championship bands and conducted clinics in Bangkok, Rayong, Khon Kaen, Nakhon Ratchasima, Chiang Mai and Chonburi.



Henderson served as Head Horn Instructor or Brass Arranger for three Drum Corps International Champions: the Santa Clara (CA) Vanguard in 1989 and 1999, and the 1992 Cavaliers from Rosemont, Illinois. He has also instructed other drum and bugle corps including the Imperial Guard from Evansville, IN, the Pride of Cincinnati from Cincinnati, OH, The Cadets from Allentown, PA, the Troopers from Casper, WY, Pacific Crest from Diamond Bar, CA, the Academy from Tempe, AZ, and the Colts, from Dubuque, IA.

In July and August of 2009, Henderson served as an adjudicator at the World Music Contest held in Kerkrade, Netherlands, where he judged over 80 bands, drum corps and concert percussion ensembles from 14 countries spanning four continents, and in July, 2013 he was invited to return to Kerkrade to judge the World Music Contest a second time. Henderson judged at the Kuala Lumpur International Marching Band Championship in December 2009, where bands from Malaysia, Thailand, Indonesia, Singapore and Cambodia performed. In 2012 and 2013, he judged the Thailand Royal Cups Concert and Marching Band Championships in Bangkok. Henderson served as an adjudicator at the Calgary Stampede Band Contest in 2005, 2007, and 2010.

Professor Henderson was an Assistant Director for the 736-member Olympic All-American College Marching Band that performed at the Opening Ceremonies of the 1984 Los Angeles Summer Olympics. He also directed the Trumpet Sectionals and served as Drill Designer for the "Swing Era" segment of the show. The Olympic Band included 125 students from UCLA. After the Opening Ceremonies, Henderson led a group of 30 UCLA students in performances at numerous Olympic venues, including Men's and Women's Gymnastics, Rhythmic Gymnastics, Tennis, Cycling, Archery, the Modern Pentathlon, and the Women's Marathon.

Henderson has composed and/or arranged band music for several major motion pictures including *In the Line of Fire, Little Nikita, Fatal Instinct, Legends of the Fall, First Daughter, Don't Say A Word, Click, Struck by Lightning*, and the main title music for *Road Trip*.

Henderson has been honored by the University of Kentucky School of Music, first by being selected for the Inaugural Hall of Fame in 1996, and then as a Distinguished Alumnus in 2010. Henderson was also selected for the Santa Clara Vanguard Drum and Bugle Corps Hall of Fame in 2021.

Professor Henderson retired on October 31, 2020, and lives in the Cheviot Hills neighborhood of Los Angeles with his wife Kelly, their children Logan and Mia, and their dog Milton.

Honoring Joe Sills

UofM HONORS LEGENDARY BAND DIRECTOR JOE SILLS



They've duked it out in Whitehaven, at Crump Stadium, at Halle Stadium and at the Liberty Bowl. Though the venue has changed over the years, since 1963 the winner of what is now the Bandmaster's Championship has earned the coveted title of "baddest marching band in the land."

For nearly six decades, the University of Memphis has hosted the contest of the Mid-South's top high school marching bands. And for nearly six decades, the winner of that competition has laid claim to the most prestigious band championship in the region. Now, for the first time, the grand prize of that competition will have a name — **the Joe Sills Cup.**

"We are thrilled about the opportunity to name our championship trophy after legendary band director Joe Sills," said William Plenk, associate director of bands with the Rudi E. Scheidt School of Music. "His legacy, and the naming of this award, will connect the history of the Bandmasters Championship to the present, helping us all gain a deeper understanding of the marching band tradition in the Mid-South. We are grateful to Joe for the positive impact he had on so many lives in our region, a legacy that will be with us long into the future."

Sills competed in the contest, then known as the Mid-South Invitational, from 1964 to 1995, taking home the championship trophy nine times. He achieved a three-peat in the 60s, 70s and 80s at the helm of three different programs: Bolivar Central High School, Murray High School and Ripley High School.

Sills died on January 15, 2021 from complications related to COVID-19 at age 78.

His bands were known for innovative marching patterns and powerful musical productions that helped small, rural schools from the Mid-South compete on the national stage. Powered by precision footwork, his programs were twice invited to both the Miami Orange Bowl and the Florida Citrus Bowl, and were also featured in the Lions Club Parade in New York City.

In 1977, Sills led the Tigers of Murray High School to a Bands of America Grand National Championship, a feat that earned him a permanent place in Mid-South music education history. But it was in Memphis that his music career shined brightest.

In Memphis, Sills played his trumpet out of poverty and into history. In 1960, he was recruited from Haywood High School to Memphis State University by the school's most revered director, Dr. Tom Ferguson. Sills was one of the first horns to play Ferguson's new fight song, "Go Tigers Go," and was a member of the Tiger pep band in 1963, when a trip to the NIT basketball tournament at Madison Square Garden earned them a new nickname, "The Mighty Sound of the South."

As a student, Sills moonlighted at live shows with the Bar-Kays while earning bachelors and masters degrees in music education. As a director, no contest earned him more podium finishes than the Bandmasters Championship.

"Dad would be astonished to have his name permanently attached to the winner's trophy," says Sills' namesake son, Joe L. Sills. "His band family was his first family, long before I was born. I can't think of a better way to remember my father than to hear his name called at his favorite competition—one that his students worked so hard to master—every year."

Bandmasters Senior Class Award



In 2009, the University of Memphis Band Alumni Chapter introduced the Richard R. Ranta - Bandmasters Senior Class Award. This scholarship was created to reward an outstanding band member who has distinguished himself or herself both on and off the marching field. This winner will receive a \$1,000 scholarship to attend the University of Memphis next fall, in addition to the regular band scholarship received (contingent upon successful audition).

Candidates were evaluated on both musical and academic accomplishments. Each was required to write an essay describing how band has impacted his or her life, and how the award will assist them in achieving educational goals. Candidates were also required to obtain two letters of recommendation, including one from his or her current band director.

The scholarship is named in honor of Dr. Richard R. Ranta, former Dean of the University of Memphis College of Communication and Fine Arts. Dean Ranta is one of the Bandmasters Championship's strongest supporters, and his assistance has been an essential part of the contests's growth and success during the past decade.

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Leadership of the UofM Bands



Dr. Albert Nguyen, director of bands, conducts the University of Memphis Wind Ensemble, directs the graduate level instrumental conducting program, and oversees the Athletic, Symphonic and University Bands. Nguyen was the Assistant Director of Bands and Director of Athletic Bands at the UofM for three years and served as Interim Director of Bands in 2011-12.

Before coming to the UofM, Nguyen served as a at the University of Texas at Austin, where he directed the Concert Band and was a member of the Longhorn Band teaching staff. He was also an assistant conductor for the Wind Ensemble and frequently appeared as a guest conductor with the Wind Symphony, Symphony Band and Chamber Winds. Nguyen began his professional teaching career in Arkansas as the at Morrilton High School.

Maintaining his connection with public schools, Nguyen frequently serves as an adjudicator, clinician and guest conductor. He received his bachelor of arts degree in music education from Arkansas Tech University and the master of music and doctorate of musical arts in wind conducting from the University of Texas at Austin. He is a member of Kappa Kappa Psi, Tau Beta Sigma, the College Band Directors National Association and is a contributing author in the GIA publication Teaching Music through Performance in Band, Volume 7.



Dr. William Plenk was most recently at the University of Nevada, Reno. He received his doctor of musical arts degree in conducting from the University of California, Los Angeles, where he was assistant conductor of the UCLA Symphonic Band, associate conductor of the UCLA Wind Ensemble and associate conductor of the UCLA Brass Ensemble.

Plenk has worked with concert bands and marching bands across the United States, Singapore and Japan, including three seasons with the Tenrikyo Aimachi Marching Band from Nagoya, Japan, the eight-time All Japan National Champion.

Plenk has served on the staff of several drum and bugle corps including The Academy, Boston Crusaders and Phantom Regiment. He is currently a member of the College Band Directors National Association, College Music Society, National Association for Music Education and World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles.



Kevin McKenzie is currently the Assistant Director of Bands at the UofM working with the Mighty Sound of the South Marching and Pep Band. Before coming to the University of Memphis, Kevin served as the Director of Bands at Northpoint High School in Southaven, Mississippi, where he taught band and percussion for grades 6-12.

Kevin is the composer for the popular band fundamentals book authored by Kevin Sanders, The Hollywood Warm Up, which has been endorsed by professional musicians and band directors around the world. He is also the winner of ITEA's Excellence in Composition Award with "Axis" in 2016, the U.S. Army Band Composition Contest with "Whirlwind" in 2017 and was the Runner Up for ITEA's Excellence in Composition Award with "Contra Victus" in 2019.

Kevin holds a bachelors degree from the University of Memphis in Music Education.

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History of the Contest

- The first University of Memphis marching contest was held in 1963 at the Whitehaven High School football stadium. The winner of the contest was Milan High School, directed by Charles Cobb.
- The 1964 contest was of special significance. A real football field (high school stadium or otherwise) on which to hold the contest could not be secured. The intramural field at the UofM, which was also a place for instructors to teach archery, golf and soccer, was lined off as a 100-yard football field. The adjudicators watched the contest from the windows of neighboring dorm rooms.
- In 1965, the contest was moved to Crump Stadium in Midtown, behind Methodist Hospital. The competition remained there throughout much of the '60s and '70s. The contest has been held at all of the following locations in its history: Whitehaven Stadium, on the UofM campus (as described above), Fairgrounds Stadium, Halle Stadium and the Liberty Bowl.
- The UofM contest was one of the few contests perhaps the only one to attend in the Mid-South in the early 1960's. Large numbers of bands came from Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas, Kentucky and even Alabama to compete. The reason that the UofM contest was so attractive is that it gave band directors from small-town schools the opportunity to take their students to the big city. A trip to Memphis was not only to compete, but also a special experience for students. Thirty-five to 40 bands in attendance was not uncommon.
- When the contest was first established, it had just three adjudicators.
 There were no captions; each judge reviewed everything happening
 on the field. The number of judges increased to five when Olympicstyle judging was implemented in the 1970's. Percussion, color
 guard and drum major judges were added as the contribution of
 these units to the total program grew more and more. In the 2000's,
 the contest adopted the caption judging system, in which music,
 marching and general effect were judged by separate adjudicators.
 The percussion and color guard judges' scores are now tallied into
 the final ranking.
- Traditional marching shows were the order of the day in the
 first contests. Step two drills, pinwheels and counter-marching
 dominated the shows. Eventually, a more military style of show
 was implemented, usually called the "ankle-knee style," and bands
 would cater their shows to one side of the field as opposed to a
 show designed to please both home and visitor sides.
- As the years went by, percussion contribution and marching percussion became extremely intricate. Multiple tonal bass drums became commonplace. In the '80s, bands began fielding two forms of percussion, known as pit and battery. Battery is the marching percussion on the field, and the pit stands on the sideline very close to the 50 yard line to play mallet instruments, timpani, etc.
- Flags became very popular in the late '60s and early '70s. Rifles
 were later added as a separate group. Eventually, these groups were
 combined to form the color guard. Guards frequently change their
 flag types and flag designs in the middle of a performance. The color
 and pageantry add much to the total show. Props became

- commonplace in the early '90s, and many bands have 18-wheelers to carry their equipment around.
- The late '90s and early 2000's were tough years for the contest. By that time, many other universities, colleges and high schools in the region also held their own contests. With so many contests to choose from, fewer bands were attending the UofM competition. One of its biggest disadvantages was its facility, Halle Stadium, which was no larger than most high school stadiums and not well-maintained. Attempts were made to hold the contest in the Liberty Bowl on the afternoon before an evening game, but this proved to be impractical due to football schedules. The 2000 contest was scheduled on a game day, but had to be cancelled due to a short-notice change in kick-off time. No suitable game day could be found to hold the 2001 contest.
- Determined to save the event from extinction, former Director of Bands Dr. Sidney McKay called the University of Memphis Band Alumni Chapter into action. The alumni took complete operational responsibility for the contest, leveraging their professional skills, creative talent, connections in the business community and passion for marching bands to set the competition on a course towards future growth and success. Planning for the contest became a year-round activity, and an ambitious long-range agenda was set iin motion.
- In 2006 and 2007, the contest was aired on public television. These
 broadcasts were seen by tens of thousands of viewers, many of
 whom would have never attended a contest in person. Beginning
 in 2008, videos of band performances were made available on the
 internet. In 2012, The Bandmasters Championship introduced live
 streaming webcasts of performances.
- The Bandmasters Championship has once again taken its place among the premier marching band competitions in the Southeast.
 As the quality and quantity of participating bands continues to grow, we're proud to play a role in supporting our University and enriching the lives of thousands of high school band members.

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




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
