Robert J. Antony: Before his retirement from the University of Macau in 2019, Professor Antony was Distinguished Professor and Senior Researcher in Guangzhou University, and is currently an adjunct professor in Shandong University. His research focuses on China's cultural, social, and maritime history, and his publications include *Like Froth Floating on the Sea: The World of Pirates and Seafarers in Late Imperial South China*.

Joan Chiung-huei Chang: Dr. Chang is a Professor in the Department of English at National Taiwan Normal University, Taipei, Taiwan. She received her Ph.D. in Comparative Literature from the University of Oregon, USA. Her research is mainly on the theory of autobiography, studies of overseas Chinese, and Asian American literature.

Eleanor Choo: Ms. Choo is a student in the joint MA Global History Program at the Free University of Berlin and Humboldt University. Prior to her MA, she was a management consultant, then editor, in Malaysia and Singapore. Her interests include environmental history, trans-imperial relations and frontier studies in the Pacific.

Frank Dhont: Dr. Dhont is an associate professor at the Department of History, National Cheng Kung University, Tainan, Taiwan. His main geographical research interest is Maritime Southeast Asia and Indonesia, where he works primarily on colonized societies and people, the decolonization of Southeast Asia, as well as the early history of European – especially Dutch – expansion into Southeast Asia.

Amy Freedman: Dr. Freedman is professor and department chair of the Political Science Department, at Pace University in New York, and she is a research fellow at the Weatherhead East Asian Institute, Columbia University. She earned her MA and PhD at New York University and is the author of numerous books and articles on democracy and ethnic/religious politics in Southeast Asia.

Christopher Hulshof: Mr. Hulshof is a doctoral student who received his M.A. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison (2020) and B.A. from the University of California, Berkeley (2018). He is working on the

proliferation of imperial power in Southeast Asia during the mid-20th century, focusing on the reassertion of peripheral agency within Cold War crisis points.

Romi Jain: Dr. Jain is Executive Director, Canadian Society for Peace and Global Studies British Columbia, Canada, Dr. Jain is a winner of the competitive federal grant from SSHRC and has published in many peer-reviewed journals including *Asian Survey*, *Diplomacy & Statecraft*, and *Asian Affairs*. Aleksius Jemadu: Dr. Jemadu is a lecturer at University of Pelita Harapan. He got his B.A. in International Relations from Gadjah Mada University, his M.A. in Social Sciences from University of Indonesia, and he earned his Ph.D. from the Department of Political Sciences, Katholieke Universiteit Leuven (KUL), Belgium. He was Research Fellow at the Asia Research Institute (ARI), National University of Singapore (NUS), and served at the Institute of Defence and Strategic Studies, Singapore.

Joseph Tse-Hei Lee: Dr. Lee is professor of history and director of the Global Asia Institute at Pace University in New York. He received his Ph.D. and M.A. from SOAS (School of Oriental and African Studies), and B.A. from Royal Holloway, University of London. He authors and co-edits several books on Christianity in China, Hong Kong and Bollywood cinemas, and China's rise.

Honghe Li: Mr. Li is a postgraduate student at the School of Economics and Management, Hebei University of Technology, China. His research interests include basic industrial engineering and logistics management by researching Internet-based path design and construction. He has expertise at using graphics software to sort documents and analyze paths.

Susy Tekunan: Ms. Tekunan is a lecturer of International Relations at Universitas Pelita Harapan in Indonesia. She is also an adjunct lecturer for the Politics and Law Department at Montclair State University in New Jersey. Currently Susy is pursuing a Ph.D. in Political Science at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. Her research focus is on identity politics

and transnational governance relating to China's rise and its relationships with Southeast Asian countries, especially Indonesia.
