

This project is due <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 23rd</u> but may be handed in early if you finish.

First, choose a mystery chapter book. Do <u>not</u> choose a book, such as *Encyclopedia Brown*, that contains several short mysteries. If you have any questions about your book choice, ask Miss Williams.

After reading your book completely, you will create a Mystery Clue Box. The first thing you will need is a shoebox. If you cannot find a shoebox, you can use a regular box—not too big! You will need to cover your shoebox with white construction paper or printer paper. Next, follow these steps.

- 1. The lid of the box will be the cover. Include the title and author, as well as your own name. You may also draw a picture from the book.
- 2. On one of the side panels, draw a picture of the <u>crime</u> solver from your story. Write the character's name and two or three traits that make the character a good <u>detective</u>. If there is more than one detective, do this for each one.
- 3. On the other side panel, draw the <u>suspects</u>. Write each character's name. Tell what their <u>motive</u> might be or why they seem to be a suspect. Bonus: include any <u>alibi</u> a suspect has.
- 4. On one end of the box, state the mystery in the form of a question, such as "Who stole the Babe Ruth baseball?" You may draw a picture to go with the question if you like.
- 5. On the other end of the box, draw an important setting in the book and label it.
- 6. Next, put the <u>evidence</u> inside the box. Think of at least three <u>clues</u> your detective discovers. Find a small object to represent each one or draw pictures. You may also use pictures from magazines or other sources. Information from a <u>witness</u> can be a clue. Bonus: include and label <u>red herring</u> clues.
- 7. Last, write the <u>solution</u> on a card and put it in an envelope. Write "Solution" on the envelope. Make sure to tell who the <u>culprit</u> is and why they did it (motive.)

Bring your box to school on or before the due date. Be prepared to show your work to the class.

A few notes:

- Spelling counts!
- Use correct punctuation and capitalization.
- Make the box colorful and interesting.
- Take PRIDE in your WORK!
