

Kate Boyd is a Program Officer for the Eugene Washington PCORI Engagement Awards Program at the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI). She is responsible for strategic decision making and high-level management and monitoring of the program, its funded projects, and program activities that advance PCORI's engagement mission.

Before joining PCORI, Boyd worked in the field of global health, completing her master's practicum and thesis as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Ethiopia, consulting with the Antigua and Barbuda HIV/AIDS Network to develop and implement community-engaged HIV/TB programming, and then accompanying the Partners in Health/ ZANMI LASANTE mental health and psychosocial support team in Haiti to decentralize mental health services by engaging community health workers and formalizing a mental health system of care. While at the Colorado School of Public Health, Boyd served as a member of a PCORI Engagement Award project team, engaging refugees and community stakeholders in the Denver/Aurora metro area to better align programs and research with the health needs of the community. Boyd has extensive experience in mixed methods research and aligning research and public health programming with the needs of the communities it seeks to benefit.

Boyd received a BA in biology and environmental studies from Oberlin College, an MPH in international health and development from Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine, and is currently a DrPH candidate at the Colorado School of Public Health.
