

SWEETSERS' 83 WINS FATHER-SON EVENT

They Take Low Gross in Field of 115 Pairs Over Garden City Golf Club Links.

JESS TAKES DRIVING TEST

Grimblers and Calders Turn In Totals of 74 for Low Net—Homanses Down List.

GARDEN CITY, L. I., June 27.—Between them the Sweetsers captured just about everything in sight in the twelfth annual father and son tournament at the Garden City Golf Club today.

Jess, the former United States and British amateur champion, won the long-driving contest with a whack that traveled 242 yards 1½ feet, and he and his father, George E., won the low gross honors in the tournament with a score of 83.

The only prizes that eluded them were those awarded for proficiency on the practice putting green. The best either of them could do there was a 37.

One hundred and fifteen pairs started out in the tournament proper, and from early morning until within an hour of sunset there was a constant procession of sons and sires around the famous old course, which holds such a proud position in the golf world—the scene of many championships and the home club of Walter J. Travis, one of the greatest golfers of all time.

Some Sons Are Taller.

It made a great sight, these proud fathers and even prouder sons, starting out for a do-or-die round together. Some of the youngsters came about up to their dad's beltline, and some of the dads came no higher standing alongside their son.

The Sweetsers were almost the last in, playing with the Joneses, R. A. and R. A. Jr., and after the third hole they had no trouble keeping up with them. Dick and his father got the jump on Jess and George E. by getting pars on the first two holes, as against a 5 and a 4 for the other pair.

After that it was pretty much of a walk-over for, while the ex-champion and his father stuck close to par all the way, the Joneses ran into a number of bad holes which put them out of the running before the turn.

The winners had only two 6s in their round, one coming on the fourth hole, where George topped his drive in front of the tee, and the other at the thirteenth, where Jess's overeagerness to "give one a ride" forced his father to play the next shot out of the roadway which divides the two fairways.

Greens Are Slippery.

Their score, while five strokes higher than the one that gave Sheppard Homans and his son, Eugene, the honors last year, was good considering the slippery greens. Had the Sweetsers been able to save extra putts on two of the greens and get 3's at the short holes they would have duplicated the Homans's score, which stands as the lowest made on the Garden City course.

They had to put pressure on at the finish, especially at the sixteenth, where George sliced his drive into a bunker. Jess put the ball into the road. His father played it into another bunker, yet they got a 5, Jess getting out onto the green and his dad holing for one putt.

At the hole before the senior member of the golf partnership laid a spoon shot on the edge of the green and Jess, in his eagerness to gobble a 3, overran the hole so far that his father couldn't hole the next.

The Jameses, R. C. and R. C. Jr., of Baltusrol, who tied for second low gross with E. S. Knapp and E. S. Knapp Jr., last year, tied for second place today with a score of 85. The other pair to hole the course in 85 were the Winstons—Owen, a former Harvard golfer, and Owen L., his son. They just reversed out and in figures, the Jameses going out in 41 and coming back in 44 and the Winstons taking 44 out and finishing 3, 4, 3, for a 41.

The Homanses, last year's winners, looked like certain repeaters up to the thirteenth hole. After going out in 40 they started back with three 4s, but bumped into trouble from there on through the sixteenth hole, their figures for the four-hole stretch being 6, 7, 7, 6. The Knapps, who won in 1922 and 1923, were 90, five 6s, four on the last nine, spoiling their chances.

Grimler Duo Scores.

Low net honors were divided between T. R. Grimler of the New York Newspaper Golf Club and his son, R. L. and Alex Calder and Alex Jr. of Upper Montclair. The Grimlers, who finished second to the Sweetsers in 1919, had an 87 with a handicap of thirteen strokes, and the Calders a 99 with a twenty-five stroke allowance.

J. H. Lanman and L. T. Lanman of Rockaway Hunting and G. G. and J. Ackerman of Arcola tied for second low net with 75s, each pair being handicapped at eighteen strokes. Alfred S. Bourne, who has been kept out of golf for a long time by illness, and his son, Kenneth, had a creditable 87, four 6s ruining the chances for victory.

The Ashforths also were well in the running until they hit the seventeenth hole. Par for that one and the last would have given them an 82, but they had to put down a 9 at the sixteenth as a result of a lot of bunker trouble and a 6 on the last hole.

There were some other well-known golfers in the field. P. D. Kountze, the ex-Yale oarsman, who won the Lido tournament this Spring played with his father, H. D., but the best they could do was 91, three 7s on the first nine bringing their outgoing total up to 48. Eddie Driggs, the newly crowned Metropolitan amateur champion, and his father were 46-48 for a 94.

Rodes Down the List.

A. B. Rode and his son, A. B. Jr., representing Sleepy Hollow, winners of the low net prize last year, fell far below the mark this year.

In the driving competition, Eugene Homans was second to Sweetser with a mark of 238 yards, 2 feet, 9 inches, and Eddie Driggs was third. The putting competition was divided into two parts, one for the fathers and another for the sons. G. K. Vanostrand led the fathers with a score of 34, H. A. Frey taking second place with a stroke more. The sons' event resulted in a tie among

H. A. Frey Jr., F. E. Laimbeer Jr., R. A. Jones Jr., and H. F. Reikly, their scores being 33.

At the annual meeting of the association here today, Albert Blashforth was re-elected President; Delos W. Cooke and Wilson S. Kinnear, Vice Presidents; Frederick H. Ecker, Treasurer, and William Bliss, Secretary. Harmon S. Graves, William Fellowes Morgan, H. H. Treadwell and Mr. Kinnear, whose terms as Governors expired, were all re-elected.
