

ARMOUR-FARRELL OFF ON TOUR TODAY

Start New England Swing at
Yale Golf Club on Trip
Lasting Till November.

PLAN 2 WESTERN JAUNTS

To Sandwich More Eastern Matches
In Between—In Western Open
and P. G. A. Championships.

Tommy Armour, United States and Canadian open champion, and Johnny Farrell, winner of the Metropolitan, Eastern, Shawnee and four other open championships since May, will leave today for an exhibition tour which will keep them playing matches daily from now until November.

Their first match as a team will be played at the Yale Golf Club, New Haven, this afternoon. After that they will swing up through New England, playing at Danbury, Conn., Portsmouth, N. H., Portland, Me., Kennebunk, Me., Augusta, Me., and Waterville, Me. Then they will swing west, playing matches through Ohio, Indiana and Michigan, and one in Ontario, and aiming for Chicago, where, on Sept. 8, 9 and 10, they will compete in the Western open championship at Olympia Fields and try to keep their tournament-winning record intact.

Following the Western open they will play in the Chicago District open championship and then return East to play exhibitions at Jamestown, Buffalo, Elmira, Hartford, Boston, Bethlehem, Pa., Richmond, Washington, Wilmington and Atlantic City. They will then leave on another Western jaunt which will take them through Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa and Illinois, and bring them down into Texas in time to play in the P. G. A. championship at Dallas, starting on Oct. 31.

Bobby Cruickshank will then join up with Armour and the two will make a tour of the Coast, where they will play in all the big Western tournaments this Winter and then swing back through Texas to Florida and Pinehurst.

TWO LINKS STARS HERE TOMORROW

Tommy Armour, U. S. and Canadian Open Champ And Johnny Farrell, To Play Here

Golf enthusiasts of New Haven tomorrow will have the opportunity of seeing in action, on the Yale course, the two best match players in the country, Tommy Armour, United States and Canadian open champion, and Johnny Farrell, one of the greatest putters that ever holed out on any green, as well as a sensational shot-maker with his other clubs. They will play Bobby Andrew, brilliant pro at the New Haven Country Club and Ben Thomson, professional at the Yale course in an 18 hole, best ball foursome. The match will start at 2:30 and will be under the direction of the Yale Athletic Association.

Plans for the match were completed by the greens committee of the Yale course consisting of Prof. R. Selden Rose, chairman; E. S. Bronson and Karl Lohmann and H. F. Woodcock, the general manager of the Athletic Association. They have completed all necessary arrangements for the staging of one of the best golf matches ever seen in Connecticut. Bob Pryde of Race Brook will be the referee.

Armour and Farrell reach New Haven tomorrow noon and will have luncheon at Mory's with the greens committee, and officials of the Athletic Association and one or two others.

Play will be from the back tees and the experts will shoot at a par 70 and a course record of 72, the last mark being made from the back tee in one this Spring, his shot being 225 yards and down.

Thomas and Andrew are prepared to give Armour and Farrell a great fight for honors over Yale's magnificent course and the match will mark the first important professional foursome over the new course.

BRITISH POLO TEAM OUTWEIGHED

New York, Aug. 16.—(AP)—The British army-in-India polo team that meets the United States four in the international challenge cup series next month will rely on speed to match the weight advantage of the Americans. Announcement of the British lineup reveals that three of the Britons will be out-weighted greatly. The weight factor is almost as important in this modern rough-and-tumble game as it is in football.

The English team will comprise Captain Claude E. Pert, number one; Major Austin H. Williams, number two; Captain C. T. I. Roark, number three, and Major Eric G. Atkinson, back. All are World War veterans and seasoned in polo competition, most of which came during military service in India. Major Atkinson is the only member who played on the 1924 British team in the international matches.

Handicaps of the players would indicate there is little to choose between them and the American team of Winston Guest, Tommy Hitchcock, J. Cheever Cowdoin and Devereux Milburn. The British handicaps total 33 and those of the United States, 34.

The invaders will be superbly mounted. They brought the finest string of polo ponies that England has ever had for the classic series.

LOTT WINS PLACE ON DAVIS TEAM

New York, August 16.—(AP)—Conquering his most dangerous rival in the first of a series of test matches to decide the fourth member of the American Davis Cup team, Francis T. Hunter of New Rochelle, N. Y., has reached the height of his game and is now playing better tennis than at any time during his career, observers agreed today.

Hunter outclassed George M. Lott, Jr., of Chicago at the West Side Tennis Club, Forest Hills, yesterday, and won by scores of 3-6; 6-1; 11-9; 6-1. Although no formal selection has been made it is virtually certain that William T. Tilden, William M. Johnston, Richard N. Williams and Hunter will carry the fight to the French challengers.

Famous Golfers Play On Yale Course Today

**Tommy Armour, United States and Canadian Open
Champion, and Johnny Farrell, In Special Match
With Bobby Andrew and Ben Thom-
son This Afternoon**

At 2:30 this afternoon on the Yale golf course, Tommy Armour, United States and Canadian open champion, and John Farrell, present holder of seven open championships, will play Ben Thomson, pro at the Yale course, and Bobby Andrew, of the New Haven Country Club, in the 18-hole, best ball foursome in the first big professional match staged in New Haven since Red Tay and Harry Vardon played the Race Brook course over six years ago.

A record-breaking following of golf enthusiasts from all over Connecticut is expected to follow the match, which will be run off under the auspices of the Yale University Athletic Association. Armour, the champion of North America, has had a spectacular rise in the professional ranks and he is rated by many as the greatest iron player of all time, while Farrell is the per of all putters. The teaming up of these two wizards of the links makes about the best combination possible. As match players they ought to be unbeatable.

However, Thomson and Andrew are entirely familiar with the Yale course and Andrew holds the course record of 72. This acquaintance with the course should hold the local pair in good stead and should offset the

greater skill of the open champion and his teammate to some extent. For benefit of those coming from out of town, the Athletic Association will have tickets on sale at its office up to 2 o'clock and at the gate at the entrance to the Ray Tompkins Memorial. Those unfamiliar with the route should go out Whalley Avenue to Fountain Street to Vista Terrace, where sign posts will direct the automobilist to the course.

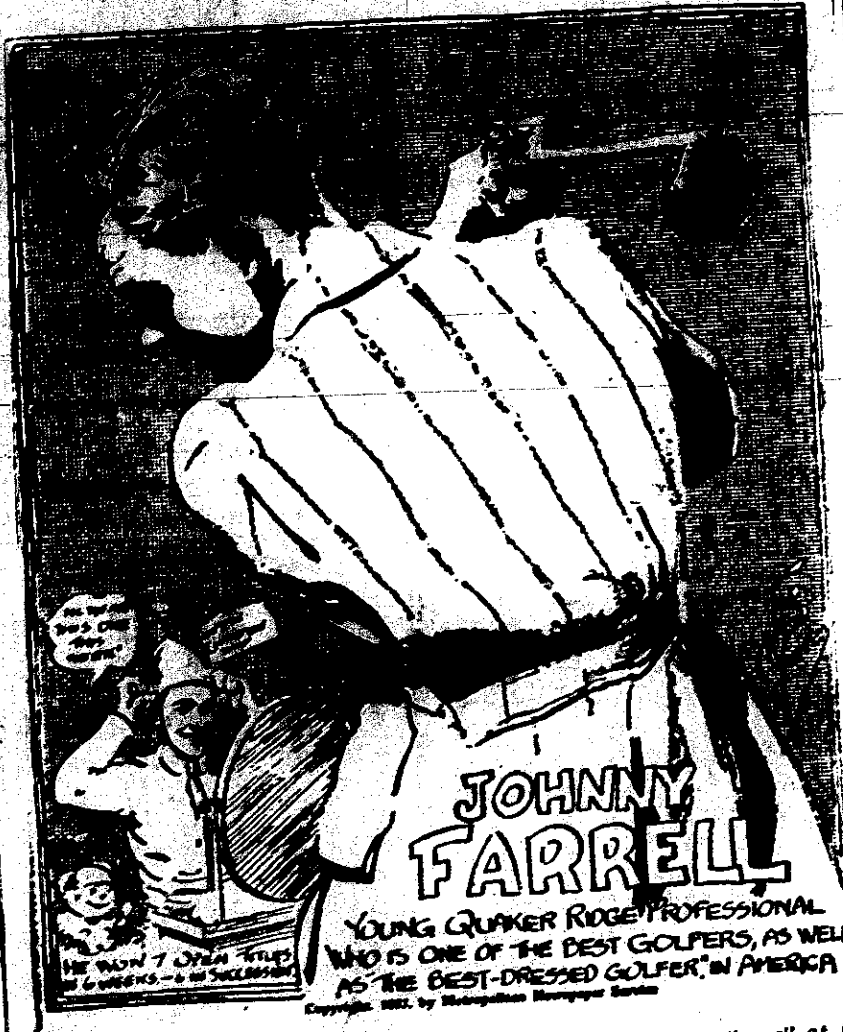

Johnny Farrell, that smiling, black-haired, Irish lad who "pros" at the Quaker Ridge Club, near New York City, and who dazzles the eye of the spectators at links of tournaments with his golf as well as with his golf apparel, is the real champion of 1927, even though he did not win the United States or British open titles. Can you name any other amateur or pro who has won as many near-major golf championships as this 26-year-old sheik? The Metropolitan, Shawnee, Massachusetts, Eastern, and Pennsylvania open titles, all won by Farrell, are high-class events, and in them he defeated fields nearly as fine as the one that competed in the United States open at Oakmont. And his marvelous score of 279 at Shawnee put him in a class with the best shot-makers in the world.

In winning six consecutive golf championships following the national, in which he placed seventh (the 36-hole Wheeling and the 72-hole Philadelphia were the other first places he bagged following the Oakmont affair, which was preceded by the Metropolitan), he averaged close to 72 strokes per round, and was under 70 on six different occasions. Three or four things combined to set this Irishman on his wild winning streak. Improvement in his iron play, a long rest necessitated by an operation for a carbuncle that laid him low during the Los Angeles open in January, a siege of training in a gymnasium that improved his digestion and built up his muscle, and a change in his mental attitude; all these things were responsible for Johnnie's winning seven out of eight tournaments, six of them in succession.

John Farrell won't be known merely as a champion medalist now. He has established a links precedent, and it can't be many years before he comes into his own with a win in the United States open.

Unsecured claims of \$13,480 and total liabilities of \$37,630 are listed in the voluntary bankruptcy petition of James Stryeu, builder and contractor, of Stamford, filed with the clerk of the United States District Court here this morning. Assets, consisting of realty in Pennsylvania, are listed at \$17,200. His wife, Isabella Stryeu, filed a petition simultaneously with that of her husband, showing liabilities of \$24,745, against listed assets of \$20,000.

Nebo Zachl, a grocer, of Plainville, filed a voluntary petition of bankruptcy this morning in which five New Haven creditors are listed among those having unsecured claims. Liabilities set forth in the schedules total \$3,455.36, against assets amounting to \$6,508.01. Among the assets is a \$5,000 insurance policy. The New Haven creditors are: S. Landow and Company, \$82; Bradley Smith and Company, \$750; the New Haven Provision Company, \$16.72; the Pepe-Maisano Company, \$71.19, and the Connecticut Macaroni Factory, \$60.26.
