

Whatever the brownness of the chair is, it must be something causally relevant to why we get a brown idea when we perceive the chair -- from PCRSQ

From the (mechanistic) science: The only properties of the chair that are causally relevant to how it reflects light, and therefore to what ideas we get when we look at it, are its primary qualities, and powers or dispositions the chair has in virtue of its primary qualities

→SQAR: brownness is either a property only of ideas, or it is reducible to primary qualities and/or powers objects have in virtue of how they are configured in terms of their primary qualities

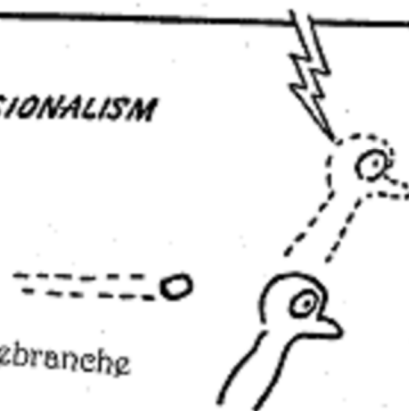
