Effective pandemic response in Taiwan: The role of Li/Lin Zhang. A study of the role of Li-Lin Zhang as an institution that “straddles” the state-society divide. By drawing on interviews with Li Zhang, academics and CDC officials in Taiwan, I explore the potential role that Li-Lin Zhang can play in achieving effective pandemic preparedness and response. This project has been adopted by the Taiwan CDC for application in Southern Taiwan
