Shiang was also a long-serving member of the Lifespan-RI Hospital Animal Welfare Committee/IACUC. Maybe most importantly, she has been an indispensable/ empathetic co-mentor too so-many surgical residents, post-doctoral fellows, medical students, graduate students, undergraduates, etc., during their tenure here in the Division of Surgical Research/Department of Surgery.
