#### **FIU Grant**

The U.S. is home to the largest population of Haitian immigrants in the world, yet little is known about Haitian immigrants living with HIV (HILWH) and their recent experiences throughout the HIV cascade of care. To address this gap, a research study entitled "Intervening with Haitian" Immigrants in the U.S. to Improve HIV Outcomes" was recently awarded to Dr. Jessy G. Dévieux, Professor at the Florida International University (FIU) Stempel College of Public Health and Social work in Miami, FL. This study, sponsored by the National Institute on Mental Health, is the first to be funded focusing on the needs of Haitian immigrants living with HIV in many years. Over a decade ago, there was a small slew of studies, documenting disproportionate late presentation to care among those living with HIV and the problem of stigma affecting the population. The purpose of this study is to develop, using mixed methods, multi-level formative data on perceived barriers and facilitators to engagement, retention, and viral suppression among HILWH today. The study will build on FIU's collaboration with Care Resource, Inc. in Project DA<sup>2</sup>RE, the successful adaptation of the iENGAGE intervention for the Merck HIV Care Connect initiative. FIU will again partner with Care Resource and another Federally Qualified Health Center in Miami to adapt and evaluate iENGAGE for Creole-speaking Haitian immigrants to address specific unmet needs leading to persistent HIV outcome disparities, including viral suppression.

#### **Care Resource Turns 40!**

For four decades, Care Resource has served some of the most marginalized folks in Miami-Dade County, starting as an HIV/AIDS service organization in the '80s to becoming a full-fledged Federally Qualified Health Center today, providing a wide-range of preventive, primary, behavioral, and social care services.
