Principal Investigator's Welcome







Preliminary Results are In!


As the National Program Office for HIV Care Connect (HCC), the University of Alabama at Birmingham's Research and Informatics Service Center (RISC) is responsible for conducting ongoing evaluations for the funding organization, the Merck Foundation, in order to measure the effectiveness HCC interventions across all three sites. As part of these efforts, we collect clinical and patient reported outcomes data on a quarterly basis from the sites. The first data upload was completed in March 2022, and although we are still processing and analyzing these data, we wanted to at least show you some demographic characteristics of HCC participants. Take a look at the piecharts below to get a feeling for the **180 HCC participants** included in the March data!

Evidence-Based Interventions: iENGAGE and ARTAS

The overarching goal of HIV Care Connect is to improve linkage to and retention in high-quality HIV care for populations in the Southeastern United States most impacted by HIV, as well as develop sustainable collaborations between the health care sector and other social sectors to address barriers to HIV care. A primary route for addressing barriers and improving healthcare outcomes is through evidence-based interventions (EBIs), or practices/programs that use integrated strategies, activities, and services and have documented effectiveness in changing targeted behavior. For HIV Care Connect, two different EBIs—Integrating Engagement and Adherence Goals upon Entry (iENGAGE) and Anti-Retroviral Treatment and Access to Services (ARTAS)—are being utilized to guide program grantees' interventions.

iENGAGE is an intervention for people living with HIV (PLWH) who are newly enrolled in HIV care to help support their efforts in achieving and maintaining viral suppression. Because retention in HIV care and adherence to prescribed antiretroviral therapy (ART) are two key behaviors that lead to sustained viral suppression, the iENGAGE intervention targets motivation and skill-building through a series of sessions and screeners that identify strengths, barriers, and social determinants of health (SDOH) in a target population. ARTAS is an individual-level, multisession intervention designed to link newly diagnosed PLWH to comprehensive medical care. ARTAS is rooted in the Strengths-based Case Management (SBCM) Model, which encourages participants to identify and use their personal strengths to create goals for managing their HIV diagnosis, as well as build an effective working relationship with their case managers, social workers, and linkage coordinators. This intervention is useful in empowering participants in creating and managing an action plan best suited for their diagnosis and lifestyle. MAO Completes Pilot of Job Readiness Program for CARE Participants

Medical Advocacy and Outreach's (MAO) <u>C</u>reating <u>A</u>ccess, <u>R</u>etention, and <u>E</u>ngagement (CARE) program for the HIV Care Connect initiative aims to address barriers to care for MAO's unusually high percentage of women living with HIV (WLWH). To assist




in securing economic stability for WLWH, CARE has created a Job Readiness Program to help enrollees feel competent and confident as they search for and maintain employment. This 8-week program uses a hybrid model to pair in-person and online instruction for both Montgomery and Dothan clients and covers a variety of topics including interactive/communication skills, active listening, problem-solving, career exploration, job search and applications, and interview preparation.

The Job Readiness Program, led by MAO's Director of Human Resources Sandra Orum, successfully completed its first session in June of 2022. celebrated by CARE staff and participants. The program has been met with success and increased interest, with the second session for new enrollees recently starting. In June of 2022, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) launched the "I am a Work of ART"

campaign, a community-informed national campaign designed to encourage people living with HIV to seek care, stay in care, and <u>achieve viral suppression</u> by taking <u>antiretroviral</u> <u>therapy (ART)</u>. This campaign works as part of the Ending the HIV Epidemic in the U.S. (EHE) by supporting the EHE key pillar to "Treat people with HIV rapidly and effectively to reach sustained viral suppression." In 2021, Care Resource partnered with Positive People Network (PPN), a peer-led HIV/AIDS organization that is focused on educating the community on HIV prevention and PrEP and offering support to PLWHA in the community. PPN founder and executive board member, Alecia Tramel-McIntyre, has been selected as one of the "I am a Work of ART" campaign's models and spokespeople!
