#### **Principal Investigator's Welcome**





#### **Preliminary Results are In!**

As the National Program Office for <u>HIV Care Connect (HCC)</u>, the University of Alabama at Birmingham's Research and Informatics Service Center (RISC) is responsible for conducting ongoing evaluations for the funding organization, the Merck Foundation, in order to measure the effectiveness HCC interventions across all three sites. As part of these efforts, we collect clinical data on a quarterly basis from the sites. The first data upload was completed in March 2022 and we are planning to receive the next data upload in early 2023. We collect patient reported outcomes data on a rolling basis via REDCap, so the data in the charts below represents the data available via REDCap up to 10/26/22 since the start of the project. As a note, ART Adherence is self-reported data based on a five-point Likert scale ranging from extremely poor to excellent.

#### Care Resource's Project DA-RE Selected to Participate in Oldr Case Study



Earlier this year, Care Resource's HCC Initiative, Project DARE, was one of three programs selected by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of Infectious Diseases and HIV/AIDS Policy (OIDP) to participate in a cost-benefits case study. The primary aim of this study was to better understand the cost and benefits of health interventions that address the social determinants of health (SDOH) that impact people living with HIV (PLWH) and the wrap-around services they provide to assist PLWH in achieving viral suppression. The data collection activities for this case study included: (1) extensive document review; (2) interviews with project staff; and (3) interviews and surveys with Project DARE clients.

Finalized in October 2022, the case study revealed that clients feel they receive immediate, individualized support from Project DARE staff that have ultimately helped them improve their mental health, access to HIV care, and medication adherence. Clients also report feelings of trust

and comfort with project staff, as well as appreciation for staff listening to their concerns and developing individualized care plans. The case study also revealed a significant return on investment: for each dollar spent on clinical and supportive services for PLWH, \$7.62 worth of services is delivered to PLWH and the community!
