Alabama AHEC Network Welcomes Dr. Becky Reamey as Director



We are pleased to announce that Becky Reamey, Ph.D., has been promoted to Director of Alabama AHEC Network. Dr. Reamey joined the team in late 2021, initially as Associate Director and later as Interim Director, bringing with her a deep commitment to education, research, and workforce development.

North Alabama AHEC and the Pri-Med P.A.C.T Project with NAO

North Alabama AHEC has been selected as one of eight AHEC centers across the country to participate in the prestigious Pri-Med P.A.C.T. (Practical Approaches to Comprehensive Treatment of Pain) initiative, in collaboration with the National AHEC Organization (NAO). The goal of this project is to recruit 30 healthcare providers from under-resourced communities, particularly those serving rural populations, to complete a specialized 4-hour Continuing Medical Education (CME) training series. The course, hosted by Pri-Med, will equip providers with practical, evidence-based strategies to manage and treat chronic pain comprehensively.

This selection underscores North Alabama AHEC's ongoing commitment to improving healthcare access and outcomes in underserved regions, where resources are often limited, and pain management can be challenging. By empowering local providers with advanced training in pain treatment, NAAHEC aims to address critical healthcare gaps in these communities.

We extend our heartfelt congratulations to North Alabama AHEC for being awarded this opportunity, and we are eager to witness the positive impact this initiative will have on healthcare delivery in the region!

PRECEPTOR REGISTRATION NOW OPEN!

Register NOW for the Alabama Preceptor Tax Incentive Program (APTIP)

In 2023, Alabama legislature approved the **Alabama Preceptor Tax Incentive Program (APTIP)** to offer a tax deduction to uncompensated healthcare professions preceptors in our State. The goal of the APTIP is to increase medical student training in rural and underserved counties in Alabama.

Administered by the Alabama AHEC Network, APTIP provides a \$500 income tax credit incentive for each 160-hour clinical preceptorship rotation per calendar year for what would otherwise be unpaid work by community-based preceptors who meet eligibility requirements.

Graduate Psychology Education Program Grant

The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) released a new Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to increase access to behavioral health services in high need and high demand areas.

The Graduate Psychology Education Program (GPE) provides training to doctoral health service psychology students, interns, and postdoctoral residents in integrated, interdisciplinary behavioral health. The program will prepare trainees to provide behavioral health services in community-based primary care settings. The program also supports faculty development in health service psychology.

HRSA will award approximately **\$22.8 million to up to 50 grantees** over a period of **three years** through this funding opportunity.

- Public and private institutions of higher education
- · Hospitals and rural health clinics
- HRSA-funded health centers and Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs)
- Nonprofit organizations
- State and local governments
- Tribal governments and organizations
