


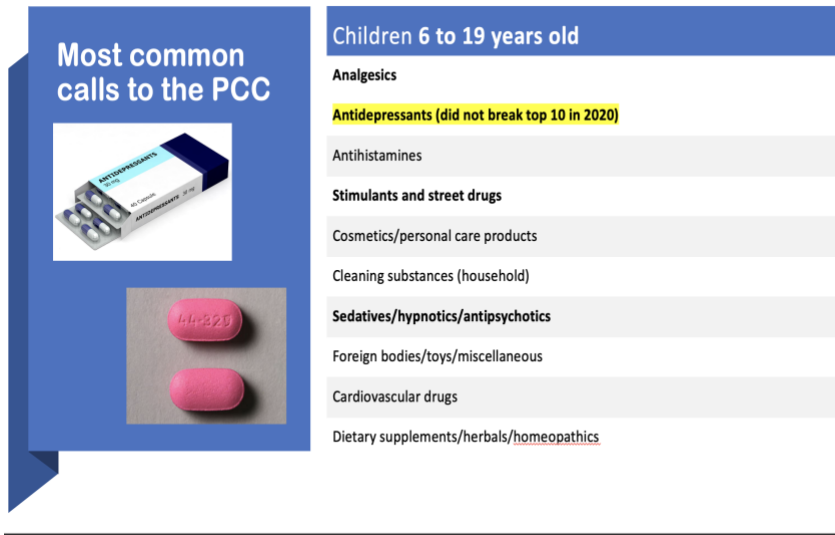
<p><b>Data Champion</b></p>	<p>The <b>January 2023 Data Champion Award</b> recognized the invaluable and longstanding contributions of <b>KIDS COUNT in Delaware</b> to promote data driven policy for the health and wellbeing of children, youth, and their families throughout the state. Janis Barlow, KIDS COUNT in Delaware Director and Policy Scientist from the UD Center for Community Research and Service accepted the award on behalf of the initiative which has been part of the national KIDS COUNT network for over 25 years.</p>
<p><b>SEOW Presentation: Highlights from the Field</b></p>	<p>Dr. Rachel Ryding, SEOW facilitator, provided an overview of newly available data resources of potential interest to SEOW Network Members. She noted that there have been data collection challenges and other impacts related to the COVID-19 pandemic and that this context must be considered when reviewing data during this time frame. <p><b>Q/A Discussion</b></p>	<p>Participants provided a number of interesting comments and questions. Katie Capelli, DPH requested additional information on the data methodology regarding the LGBTQ data. Jessica Graham also requested resources in Delaware for these youth. The SEOW team provided resources in support of LGBTQ in the chat, such as Camp Rehobeth. Bill Lynch recommended collecting this in a resource guide and Katie Capelli shared information on a DPH initiative for ongoing collection of substance use treatment and prevention resources. Shawn Stevens also recommended the DE Helpline as a starting point. MJ recommended that stakeholder input is important in terms of collecting information on not only resource needs but on resource availability to avoid duplication of services as well as resource</p>

gaps. Orlando Foreman initiated discussion about how to provide these supports in school settings. Sandy Siglowski noted that this is a goal of Project AWARE and that more work is needed in this area. Teri Lawler of the DE DOE also affirmed Orlando and Network Connect’s efforts to provide inclusive programming as the most effective strategy. Sharon noted that the theme of this year’s Trauma Awareness Month, held annually in May, is You Belong which resonates with this discussion although it is not restricted to youth or a specific population. Bill Lynch highlighted the “connect the dots” program in a school district in NJ which asks students to identify a person in the school environment who they had a trusted connection with, then asks the school personnel which students they had a connection with, in order to identify students who are isolated. In addition, the area police reach out to schools whenever there is an incident involving students. Teri and Sharon volunteered that the Connect the Dots is in effect in some districts in Delaware as well as Take Care, Delaware, similar to the outreach from police departments to school personnel. Katie Capelli also discussed My Reason Why Delaware campaign as a substance use prevention strategy but can also be used for broader, asset-based initiatives. She encouraged participants to use and promote the My Reasons Why Delaware hashtag.

**Featured Presentation:  
The Poison Control Center at CHOP**

Lauren Longo, Associate Director of Advocacy and Communication of the Center for Public Health Readiness and Response at the Children’s Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) introduced Dr. Kevin Osterhoudt, the featured speaker. Dr. Osterhoudt presented an overview of recent data from the Poison Control Center (PCC) at CHOP, Philadelphia College of Pharmacy & Medicine. It is the HRSA designated center for 8.9 million people in Delaware and Pennsylvania. Among the highlights:

- In 2021, 5,617 calls were received from Delaware
- Most common calls were regarding children under 6 years old
- Calls by substance include:



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• There has been a rise in child marijuana poisoning (both in hospital data as well as PCC data); cause include decreased stigma, increased availability (including edibles), increased THC content</li> <li>• Delta-8-THC, a minor alkaloid in hem which is now being purified as “legal high,” will be something to monitor</li> <li>• Data can inform policy recommendations to reduce risk and harm, particularly as states move to legalize marijuana</li> </ul> <p>The group followed up with questions to the presenters and comments regarding policy issues, questions regarding the “disconnect” between referrals for ER visits versus calls to the PCC, and the data shared.</p> <p>(NOTE: The slide deck for this presentation is available on the <a href="#">SEOW Presentations page.</a>)</p>
