STEP 1: Conservation Planning

To get started with NRCS, we recommend you stop by your local NRCS field office or give us a call to schedule a farm visit. We'll discuss your vision for your land and walk the land with you. And ultimately create a conservation plan for you that serves as a roadmap to reaching your conservation goals.

STEP 2: Applying for Assistance

Once your conservation plan is in place, we can help you decide if financial assistance is available to address resource concerns on your farm.

We'll walk you through the application process to apply for financial assistance.

STEP 3: Checking Eligibility

As part of the application process, we'll check to see if need specific items to be eligible.

- Assigned Farm & Tract number
- Adjusted Gross Income (AGI)
- Compliance with Highly Erodible Lands and Wetlands (AD-1026)
- Determined Farm Operation Plan (902)
- Banking Account Information on file

STEP 4: Ranking

In state ranking pools are created to rank like applications to like.

- The ranking process is done through our business tool CART that bases scores on set algorithms and is site specific.

 - Existing site condition
 Planned Conservation Practices
 Environmental Benefits of Resource Concerns addressed.

STEP 5: Implementing

If your application is selected for funding, you'll sign a contract and receive <u>cost share</u> once the contract item is completed.

Along with your contract you may receive:

- Job sheets or implementation requirements that explain how to execute the practice.
- Blueprints tailored to the practice you may be constructing.
- Operation & Maintenance documents

Agricultural Management Assistance (AMA)

- AMA is available in only 16 states. State participation is determined by a historical low participation in Federal Crop Insurance Program.
- No payment limitation during the length of the Farm Bill however yearly payments are limited to \$50,000.
- Yearly limitation applies to AMA & RMA funds administered throughout the year to the participant.
- Delaware has tailored the AMA program to focus on high tunnels and associated practices.

Environmental Quality Incentives Program

- NRCS' flagship program for helping producers apply conservation practices on their land
- Provides financial and technical assistance to address natural resource concerns
- Benefits include:
 - Improving air, soil and water quality
 - Conserving water
 - Preventing soil erosion
 - Enhancing wildlife habitat
 - Mitigating impacts from climate change
- NRCS accepts applications year-round. Application cut off deadlines are announced annually. <u>March 15 is Delaware's</u> <u>second application deadline.</u>

Small Farm Conservation Practices

NRCS has adjusted cost share of some conservation practices to account for implementation on a smaller scale.

Example of practices with a small-scale option:

- Cover Crop
- High Tunnel
- Reduced Tillage/No Till
- Micro-Irrigation
- Raised Beds





Other practices?

Irrigation Water Management Plan

- Irrigation System Upgrades
- Irrigation motor conversion from diesel to electric
- Increasing to a more efficient diesel irrigation motor

Pollinator Habitat

Nutrient Management

Pest Management

No Till/Strip Till/Mulch Till

Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)

- Helps producers take their conservation activities to the next level by incorporating whole farm planning
- Producers receive payment for conservation already being done on the operation
- Additional payments for conservation activities incorporated into their operation.
- CSP contracts are for 5 years and has the option to renew.
- Minimum annual payment is \$4,000
