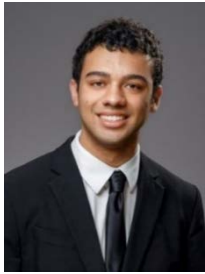


2021 Summer Research Program- Public & Global Health Track

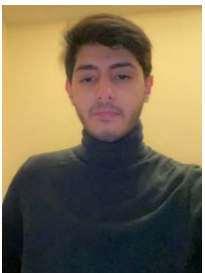
Will Hutson – *Centene Institute for Advanced Health Education Scholar*
