CSD Notables

Director <u>Michael Sherraden</u> was interviewed by Faculty Director <u>William</u> <u>Elliott III</u> (University of Michigan) and Melinda K. Lewis (University of Kansas) for an episode of the <u>Tangible Hope podcast</u> from the University of Michigan's Center on Assets, Education, and Inclusion, of which Elliott is the founding director and Lewis an associate director. The three discussed the future of asset-building policy and research, and what has changed since Sherraden's seminal 1991 book "Assets and the Poor." Faculty Director Jin Huang is one of three scholars serving as chairs of the Inequality, Poverty, & Social Welfare Policy (IPSWP) cluster for the 2025 annual conference of the Society for Social Work and Research. Due to the efforts of Dr. Huang and Faculty Associate <u>Yunju Nam</u> (University at Buffalo, SUNY), the list of topics within the IPSWP cluster has been expanded to include financial capability and asset building. Submissions are due by April 15 (see below).

Faculty Director <u>Darrell Hudson</u>, director of the Washington University Center for the Study of Race, Ethnicity & Equity (CRE2), moderated a discussion with CRE2 Distinguished Visiting Scholar Heather McGhee. Organized and sponsored by CRE2 in part through funding from the Office of the Provost: Distinguished Visiting Scholar Program, the event was cosponsored by the Weidenbaum Center on the Economy, Government, and Public Policy, Clark-Fox Policy Institute, CSD, Here and Next, and the Program for Public Scholarship. <u>Ray Boshara</u>, a national expert on wealth inequality and household financial security, has joined CSD as a senior policy advisor. As part of this appointment, Boshara serves as a legislative fellow with the Office of U.S. Senator Bob Casey, where he has shared evidence to inform the federal "401Kids" proposal. <u>Learn more</u>.

<u>Shu Fang</u>, professor in the School of Sociology and Psychology at the Central University of Finance and Economics in Beijing, a leading expert on financial social work and social policy in mainland China, has joined CSD as the center's newest faculty director. <u>Learn more</u>.

Metzger discussed the dynamics of tax incentives in the City of St. Louis, who benefits from them, the details on recent changes, and how the tools could be used to foster more equitable development. Postdoctoral Fellow <u>Aytakin Huseynli</u> will attend meetings associated with three international convenings in early April. As a representative of the Brown School, Huseynli will attend the General Assembly of the International Association of Schools of Social Work (IASSW). The April 4 gathering is open only to representatives from member schools. On April 1 and 2, she will attend the invitation-only General Meeting of the International Federation of Social Workers (IFSW). Huseynli will also take part in meetings of the International Council of Social Welfare (ICSW) in advance of the <u>2024 Joint</u> <u>Conference on Social Work, Education, and Social Development</u>, which she will also attend.

Huseynli has accepted the 2024 Outstanding Social Work Doctoral Dissertation Honorable Mention Award from the Society for Social Work and Research for "Effect of Resource Curse on Child Well-Being in Resource-Rich States, Specifically in Post-Soviet States." Society President (and CSD Faculty Director) <u>Sean Joe</u> and Awards Committee Chair Gina Miranda Samuels presented the award at the organization's annual meeting on January 13. <u>Learn more</u>.

At the 28th annual conference of the Society for Social Work and Research, CSD affiliates convened five special interest groups, organized four symposia, and delivered 23 presentations. Seven roundtables and workshops featured representatives from the CSD community. In total, 27 affiliates – senior scholars, research staff, a postdoctoral fellow and research associates – participated in the conference. Learn more.

Faculty Associate <u>Chunhui Ren</u> (Lingnan University) published a study on homeownership in the United States, finding that income predicts whether first-time renters become homeowners but that liquid wealth, not income, is a primary determinant of whether first-time homeowners avoid going back to renting. Faculty Associate <u>Sicong Summer Sun</u> (University of Kansas) published a study examining how race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic factors – especially parental wealth – are associated with substance use across an 18-year span from adolescence to young adulthood.
