

From the Director

This year's annual report highlights decisive progress toward the CIPE's founding vision to improve the health and wellness of the greater St. Louis region. We are purposefully cultivating a collaborative culture and listening to both internal and community stakeholders to build authentic partnerships to add value to those we hope to serve.

The newly designed Phase I IPE curriculum for all 700 first-year learners will roll out Fall 2019, taught by more than 70 clinicians and faculty. The highly interactive three, 3-hour sessions will feature a poverty simulation, engaging activities around collaborative communication skills, and exposure to clients/patients who have navigated the health care system while un-or under-insured. Meanwhile, several pilot projects are helping us determine the parameters for Phase II which will include a menu of selectives or passport activities.

Partnerships to embed interprofessional teams of students in clinical care are solidifying. The Clinical Learning and Practice Transformation Team has found that one key component includes starting where our learners are already co-located and simply formalizing their engagement with each other. They are showing others this doesn't have to be hard!

Several CIPE champions have disseminated our work this year across local and national conferences, reciprocally bringing back innovations to our community from other IPE programs.

In our Community of Interprofessional Champions, we inducted three new Master Interprofessional Educators this year and continue to grow those who take their interprofessional learnings back to their clinical teams!

Our team was selected to participate in the NCI-sponsored Interprofessional Education Exchange (iPEX) Project for 2019-2020. This program is designed to help interprofessional teams evaluate and optimize interprofessional education in palliative care at our institutions. The team is comprised of Maria Dans, MD, Christa Burke, MSW, Amy Jacobs, BSN, RN, CHPN, Heather Hageman, MBA, and Brian Carpenter, PhD.

While there are far too many to thank individually, we are honored to be surrounded by a strong community of interprofessional champions and community guides as we roll out Phase I of the new curriculum and form even more partnerships.

Our goal is to develop a longitudinal, integrated interprofessional education (IPE) core curriculum across the CIPE educational programs with a comprehensive program and assessment plan.

1,212 learners from six professions participated in CIPEsponsored IPE activities, including First-Year IPE Sessions, Transitions of Care Team Experience and Standardized Patient Team Experience.

Curriculum & Assessment Committee (CAC)

The **CAC** designs, reviews, and evaluates the CIPE's IPE curriculum and learner assessment in collaboration with individual programs and makes data-driven recommendations for curricular revisions as appropriate.

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND UPDATES

- Gathered feedback about existing First-Year Sessions toward development of the new Phase I curriculum.
 - Listened to stakeholders at a retreat in September 2018 facilitated by Washington University Brown School Evaluation Center.
 - Conducted 7 focus groups with 58 learners in February and March 2019 to obtain their feedback on the proposed curriculum.
- Developed the new Phase I curriculum.
- Partnered with Brown School Evaluation Center to create an evaluation plan for the proposed curriculum including a logic model, evaluation questions, and methods matrix for the center.

Transitions of Care Experience

This **pilot experience**, focusing on the transition of patients from hospital to home, is in its third year of implementation.

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND UPDATES

- Expanded from 25 learners last year to 172 learners across 5 professions. (Medicine, Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Pharmacy, and Physical Therapy)
- The case sessions were offered once in Fall 2018, and once in Spring 2019.
- 85.6% of students who completed the post-assessment survey (119 of 139 respondents) would recommend this experience to a colleague.

NEXT STEPS AND GOALS

- Adapt the experience as a Phase II passport activity for the IPE curriculum as requirements are developed by the CIPE.
- Publish pilot and 2018-19 results.

Standardized Patient Team Experience

This experience is the longest standing IPE experience on campus. It is a hands-on experience with multiple learners from medicine, nursing, occupational therapy, pharmacy, and physical therapy practicing novel ways a team might function to create an integrated discharge plan.

► KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND UPDATES


- Provided the interprofessional Standardized Patient Team Experience to a total of 334 learners.
- Faculty and student guides were revised to enhance clarity and quality of the experience. Workflow and facilitator guides were continually refined and improved after each session.
- A teamwork communication rating scale was developed that both students and facilitators were asked to complete throughout Encounter 1 and 2 to provide feedback to the team. Facilitators were trained in advance of the session on how to optimize feedback to their teams.
- 87.3% of students who completed the post-survey experience agreed or strongly agreed that during this experience they felt comfortable demonstrating their profession's role and responsibilities (207 of 237 respondents).



It was honestly just really great working together very respectably with other disciplines and seeing how we all have our strengths and weaknesses and rely on each other to fill in the blanks and provide the best patient centered care. I thought it was super helpful to all of us to learn to respect and value the other disciplines for when we are actually in our profession."

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Community

Our goal is to establish a community of interprofessional educators who embrace and demonstrate core principles of interprofessional education and practice.

Professional Development Team

The Professional Development Team is comprised of one faculty representative from each of the CIPE collaborating institutions. Professional Development Leads guide professional development of educators and clinicians regarding interprofessional education and collaborative practice.

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND UPDATES

- Hosted 7 professional development events with 110 clinicians and educators.
- Trained 18 first-time IP facilitators involved in First-Year IPE sessions.
- 3 faculty earned the **Master Interprofessional Educator Certificate**:

IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE BROWN SCHOOL **EVALUATION CENTER**

Developed an evaluation plan, reviewed IPE 101 and 201 workshops and provided suggestions to strengthen evaluation.

Interviewed 35 faculty/educators to learn more about barriers to attending CIPE professional development workshops and how the workshops could better meet their needs.

NEXT STEPS AND GOALS

- Train first-year facilitators on the new Phase I curriculum.
- Continuous quality improvement of workshops.
- Develop resources in response to IP community needs, including presenting to uni-professional audiences during their regular meeting times.

Health Profession Student Leadership Council (HPSLC)

HPSLC is a dynamic team of interprofessional learners representing the 7 health professions on the Washington University Medical Campus. They build relationships outside of the classroom and clinic through monthly extracurricular events, community outreach, and partnerships.

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND UPDATES

- 4 events hosted with 971 attendees total.
- Interprofessional case discussion panel was a great success this year with 111 students attending.
- Pharmacy students and Washington University School of Medicine built partnerships to bring clinical pharmacy services to the Saturday Neighborhood Health Clinic.
- Abstract for the Saturday Neighborhood Health Clinic collaboration was accepted to Collaborating Across Borders Conference.
- Community outreach events: Kingdom House and Medication Take-Back.
- HPSLC collaborated with the Institute for Healthcare Improvement Student Chapter in recruiting a Washington University Medical Campus interprofessional student team for the Clarion Competition.

Practice

Our goal is to partner with clinical entities to create patient-centered collaborative care clinical practice sites. We are working to develop interprofessional practice experiences for learners in the sites.

Clinical Learning and Practice Transformation

The purpose of the **CLPT** is to assist with identifying, establishing, and/or developing sites where interprofessional teams of students can be placed. The goal is for students to learn how to work effectively in teams while contributing to the needs of the site to improve client/patient care.

► KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND UPDATES

- Developed tips for how learners can be helpful in the clinical environment.
- Sent team members to the national Preceptors in the Nexus workshop to work on how to align learners in existing clinical settings.

NEXT STEPS AND GOALS

- Host a workshop on Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act (MACRA) including payment models which foster interprofessional care.
- Implement inpatient and outpatient pilot projects.
