Kyra: The owl is in the whole universe. He is looking at the stars.

Sonali: He got the right goose. It laid one gold egg.

Shun: Owl at night, looking at the sky.

The Past Two Weeks

Our chick eggs arrived on April 1, a topsyturvy day when many of the signs in the room were mysteriously turned upside-down. The eggs were placed in the incubator pointed side down and warmed to about 100 degrees to replicate the mother hen's warmth. We have been keeping the environment moist with added water every day.

The writing table was humming with activity as everyone worked on their Chick Book, labeling parts within the egg and coloring in the chick developing inside.

We also made bird nests from materials we collected on the playground and sculpted birds from play dough, feathers, and beads. We hid plastic eggs in Room 5, found them all, and decorated the eggs with the stickers inside.

Last week we did many science experiments with eggs. We soaked both hard-

boiled and raw eggs in vinegar. In both cases the shell dissolved. The hard-boiled egg was a bit bouncier. We spun hard-boiled and raw eggs on the table and observed the difference between them. We placed many heavy things on top of several eggs. They were very strong! We predicted whether or not an egg would break when dropped from varying heights and on to varying surfaces. Then on Friday we conducted our Egg Drop Experiment to see if our predictions were correct. The Teddy Bear Class joined us.



The MySci Investigation Station was enjoyed by all. There were three areas to explore, including a bat cave. Many children volunteered to hold a millipede and a Hissing Cockroach. Other classroom science activities included our March weather chart and our weekly cooking activity, Worms and Dirt (gummies, chocolate pudding, cool whip, and oreos). We also have eleven caterpillars growing in small containers.

At the art table we made pencil drawings of the birds in our poems and filled them in with water colors. We made thumb print birds and painted with feathers. Egg shapes were made beautiful with a tissue paper collage and watercolors.

We hope that you saw the displays of our bird projects on the classroom bulletin board during the Parent-Teacher Conferences. We enjoyed talking to all of you these past two days about your wonderful children! It is such a joy to spend the morning with them.

Coming Up

The chick eggs are expected to hatch any time now! They have been removed from the machine that has been rotating them. Hatched chicks need to dry for 24 hours before they leave the incubator. We will keep them in a large plastic tub with a heat lamp. They grow very fast, as we will document by weighing them each day.

We have Spanish, Science (Birds and Nests), and music next week. We will talk about the life cycle of butterflies and do some art and science activities on that theme.
