We capped the week with a campus field trip to the Earth and Planetary Science department, where a replica of the Mars Rover is on display, as well as a variety of rocks and fossils that intrigued Sun Bears. On the sidewalk as we exited the building, bronze plaques of the planets in our solar system were embedded in the concrete.
