

"By the end of the nineteenth century, domestic sciences seemed to be flourishing. Practically every agricultural college offered it. School children studied household arts in the cities of Chicago, Boston, New York City, Toledo, and Los Angeles, to name a few".

MATILDA CAMPBELL, TEACHER

1903 – Matilda Campbell, President of the Ohio Association of Home Economic Teachers. 1903 the National Household Economic Association was held in Toledo, Ohio.

1910 – "a most enthusiastic group of more than thirty teachers present" professional meeting. Focus on community and partnership. Toledo Manual Training High School, "the boys in woodworking made a bed and the girls the bedclothes".

1913 – A Textbook of Domestic Science for High School Girls by Matilda Campbell

ALICE SWISHER, HOME AGENT

1917 or 1918

"While there were some men who thought acquiring a Home Agent was neither necessary nor desirable, the Board voted to accept the offer of the Extension Division. Miss Alice Swisher came to the County as it's first Home Agent"

Baking and canning demonstrations, work with Red Cross groups


