Exhibitors, parents and volunteers can pick up premiums. THIS WILL BE THE ONLY OPPORTUNITY TO PICK UP PREMIUMS. This process is being coordinated as a partnership between the Senior Fair Board and Muskingum County Commissioners.

### **Junior Fair Parade**

The Junior Fair parade will be Sunday, August 14 at 5:30 p.m. Floats must be on the track by the 4-H horse barn by 4:30 p.m. for judging. All other parade participants should be on the track by 5:00 p.m.

Parade line-up information will be e-mailed to the club entry contact. Parade participants should report to the track for parade line-up at the designated time listed above and check in with Junior Fair Board.

Royalty/Ambassadors should report to the track with their vehicles by 5 p.m. to find out where to line up.

### **Junior Fair Building Reminders**

**Still Project Displays** - Members in clubs without booths can display their still projects in the miscellaneous area.

Projects for the Miscellaneous Booth will be accepted Thursday, August 11 from 3-8 p.m. and Saturday, August 13, from 9 a.m.-12 p.m.

Projects will be released on Saturday, August 20, 7-8 p.m. Exhibitors who remove projects early will will not be able to exhibit a still project in 2023.

Cloverbud Booth - Clubs with Cloverbuds that do not have a booth can submit a group display for the Cloverbud Booth. Displays will be accepted in the Miscellaneous Booth on Thursday, August 11 from 3-8 p.m. and Saturday, August 13 from 9 a.m.-12 p.m.

### Livestock Bedding

No large bark bedding is permitted. Please use reground fine bedding, chip bedding or straw.

### **Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF)**

The Ohio Department of Agriculture requires that a Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) be completed for all market animals (except rabbits) and lactating dairy cattle. This form is available online ONLY in 2022. Exhibitors with these projects will be sent an email with additional instructions **FRIDAY**, **AUGUST 5**.

The form should be submitted by Friday, August 12 at 11:59 p.m. Anyone who does not complete the form by this time will be weighed in last and required to complete the form before weighing in. Should a medication be administered to the animal after the form is completed, you will need to submit the form again to report the medication, even if it is after the August 12 deadline.

### **Fans**

One per animal. All fans must have three prong plugs and be at least 24 inches off the ground. No surge protectors are permitted. Extension cords must be 12/3 wire with no wrapping around posts. Zanesville Fire Department will be on site to check for compliance.

### Treatment of Sick Animals

Any animal on the fair grounds treated by a veterinarian other than the fair vet (Foster Anderson) must be reported to the Senior Fair Office and proper paperwork completed.

### **Alternate Exhibitor Request Form**

Each exhibitor must show and sell his/her own animals. Animals shown for judging or sale by anyone other than the exhibitor will not be allowed, except by special arrangement with the Barn Superintendents in advance. Only another Muskingum County Junior Fair exhibitor can show the animal. Exhibitors must complete the Alternate Exhibitor Request form and submit it at their species barn meeting. ### **Livestock Sale Information**

Exhibitors may sell only one lot of livestock in the market animal livestock sales, Bossy's Jug and Derby Bucks Auction. The exception to this is that all overall Grand and Reserve Grand Champions must sell. Youth with multiple projects must declare which will sell in auction at the Junior Fair Office immediately after they finish showing.

**Notes about Sale Checks** - No sale checks are sent until ALL BUYERS have paid. Sale checks are only good for 60 days.

### **Buyer Thank You Signs**

All youth are encouraged to hang thank you signs for 2021 buyers. Exhibitors must provide their own signs, no blank signs are available this year.

### **Buyer Photos for Hog Exhibitors**

There will be no photographer at the hog sale printing photos for the buyer cards. Each youth with a market hog project is required to bring a photo to affix to their buyer card. Buyer cards will be available for the barn meeting. Youth should bring their cards with the photo attached to the sale.

The requirements for the picture are as follows:

- 4×6 photo of youth and their animal
- Landscape orientation
- Must follow showmanship dress code

### **Buyer Photos for Other Exhibitors**

A photographer will take buyer photos for other market animal exhibitors during the market shows.

### Sale Buyer Contacts

In order to have successful sales, it is helpful for prospective buyers to know about the sales.

- Contact people/businesses you know in advance. Some businesses make lists ahead of the fair of whose animals they might purchase.
- Invite them to the auction to bid and consider purchasing an animal (NOT just your animal).
- Give the potential buyer the date, time and location of the auction.
- Instruct new buyers to call Muskingum
   Livestock Sales (740-452-9984) to become a
   registered buyer and receive a buyer packet
   before the fair.
- Thank all bidders with a personalized card.

Announcements will not be made during the sale by auctioneers for the youth selling. If you want to donate part of your sale check to a specific cause, you may do so on your own time.

### **Dairy Reminders**

• The Junior Fair Dairy Show is Tuesday, August 16 at 9 a.m., beginning with Showmanship. Dairy exhibitors show in white shirts and white pants. Pants should be <u>over</u> boots with no leggings. We will meet in the Coliseum arena for a group photo, IN YOUR SHOW WHITES at 8:45 a.m., where we also may get instructions from the judge. Let Pam Mitchell, the barn superintendent, know if you have any questions.


### **Goat Reminders**

- Dr. Reynolds from USDA will be on the fairgrounds Sunday, August 14 to check Scrapie ID information before the barn meeting at 2:30 p.m. Exhibitors are encouraged to be present in the barn should there be any questions about your animal(s).
- If using a registered tattoo or microchip, original registration papers must be made available immediately upon request during fair. Microchipped goats must have an E or ET tattoo. If the goat has a microchip, the exhibitor must provide their own microchip scanner immediately upon request during fair. If the exhibitor cannot produce the required information or paperwork immediately, the animal will be dismissed from the grounds.

### **Horse Reminders**

- 5-way vaccination by a veterinarian is required for all horses age yearling and older to be administered by August 1. Exhibitor must submit documentation of vaccination to the Junior Fair Horse Committee at the entry booth on Day 1 of the Muskingum County Fair by the end of the 12:30 p.m. barn meeting. Any horse that does not have a vaccination record submitted by this time will be dismissed from the grounds.
- <u>NEW THIS YEAR! Derby Bucks Auction</u> The Junior Fair Horse Committee is hosting the first Derby Bucks Auction to benefit horse exhibitors! The Horse Committee is asking any club with horse projects to donate items to the Derby Bucks Auction and to invite potential buyers to the event on Tuesday, August 16 at 1 p.m. in the Horse Arena. Auction items can be horse specific (décor, tack & supplies, apparel, etc.) or not (gift cards, food items, etc.) Questions? Contact Randy Roberts at 740-319-1185.
- Please note that NO ONE is to be mounted on a horse inside the horse barns. For safety reasons, you
  must take your horse outside the horse barn to mount your horse.
- All Junior Fair Horses must undergo a Body Condition Score (BCS) evaluation by the fair horse veterinarian on the first day of the Muskingum County Fair. Any horse that does not have an adequate BCS will be dismissed from the grounds.
- Livestock trailers, as well as horse trailers, will not be permitted to remain on the fairgrounds or fairgrounds parking lots during the fair.
- To assist in keeping fair week smooth, the committee is asking that adults refrain from riding project animals during the fair. An exception would be a dangerous behavior problem with the animal.
- There should not be any riding double on horses at the fair.
- Exercise schedules will be posted at the arena. The arena must be cleared by 7:30 a.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday due to the shows. Members are to exercise horses only in the arena during designated hours.
- Judge's Meetings at the arena 20 minutes prior to show time.
- State Fair Representatives will be presented their awards during the awards program at 4:45 p.m. on Sunday of the fair. State Fair representatives will not ride their horses through to receive awards.

### **Poultry Reminders**

- Poultry will be checked in between 5 p.m. and 10 p.m. on Saturday, August 13.
   Everyone must arrive during these hours only. Bring NPIP paperwork, if necessary. Pullorum testing will be performed as needed before check-in. All birds will be checked for lice and other health conditions by the Poultry Committee.
- New this year! There will be no skirting under cages. The Poultry Committee recommends that exhibitors bring a plastic tub for storing items.
- Exhibitors must provide their own shavings.
- Poultry Barn opens at 7:00 a.m. and closes at 10:00 p.m. daily during the fair.
- Please remember to wear lab coats when showing.
- The Poultry Committee will host a Showmanship session in the Three Gables Building on Tuesday, August 16 at 7 p.m.

- Check-in for all rabbits is Saturday, August 13 from 11:00 a.m. 8:00 p.m.
- Auction Basket Donations: We need \$5-\$10 from each club to purchase the items for the auction basket. This is the main fundraiser of the committee and we rely on donations to make it successful.
- Risers are available for \$5/each You can bring your own and they are required in every pen. Monies provide a pizza party at the end of the week. (We do run out, so come early).
- Crocks are provided free of charge.
- Exhibitors need a white jacket/shirt during the show.
- Tack boxes are acceptable but MUST fit under the pens. They cannot be in the aisle.

### Swine Reminders

Please pay close attention to the following details to make your arrival and participation in the swine activities during the Muskingum County Junior Fair a smooth and rewarding experience for your 4-H member.

- Arrival time: Saturday, August 13, 7:00 p.m. through Sunday, August 14, 8:00 a.m.
- Youth must unload tack and set up stalls before arrival begins on Saturday at 7 p.m. Youth will not be permitted to unload tack during the arrival window.
- Enter Fairgrounds at Gate 4 Pershing Road.
- Exit Fairgrounds at Gate 5 Eppley Ave.
- Refer to map for traffic flow directions.

Please refer to the map below for entrance and exit locations. As a reminder, **trailers must LEAVE after livestock is unloaded**.



The Livestock Committee would like to make sure all swine exhibitors know the following prior to their arrival at fair:

- ALL show boxes must be stored above the exhibitors pen on sturdy board braces provided by the exhibitor. The widest pen in the barn is 6' wide. No show boxes will be permitted in the aisle ways or outside the perimeter of the swine barn. Show boxes found anywhere but on top of the exhibitor's pen will be removed.
- Each club with swine exhibitors is asked to provide a nice hurdle to be used by hog barn volunteers during fair week.
- During the Swine Barn Meeting, each club will be asked to have at least one adult sign up to help during the shows.
- Each club is asked to donate a bottle of rubbing alcohol and Pepto Bismol for use during the fair.
- No Junior Fair hogs can stay for the open show on Saturday. All hogs must leave on the Muskingum Livestock trucks after the sale.

### **Hog Shaving**

Hog shaving/grooming (as taken from the fair book) – no "slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears, tails and underline." Slick clipping or body shaving is defined as less than  $\frac{1}{2}$ " length of hair. Only water is permitted to be sprayed on hogs on show days.

All hogs will have their hair measured prior to market hog weigh-in. Any hog with hair below ½" will be disqualified and sent home. All hogs in the final drive for a weight division will also have their hair measured prior to entering the show arena. Any hog with hair below ½" will be disqualified. Any disqualified hog will be required to stay on the grounds, but will not be permitted to sell in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.

### Swine Influenza

Pigs can be infected with swine influenza viruses that are different from human flu viruses. Swine flu viruses spread among pigs and—while rare—can spread from pigs to people too. Reminder, Senior Fair Board has recommended arrival times for a few species and designated traffic patterns to help with the flow of traffic dropping off and picking up animals.

All Junior Fair cattle exhibits are encouraged to arrive through Gate 6 between 12:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 13.

All Junior Fair sheep and goat exhibits are encouraged to arrive through Gate 6 between 1:00 p.m. Saturday, August 13 and 8:00 a.m. on Sunday, August 14.

Senior Fair Board would like to remind everyone of arrival times for animals including those not required to be in place by 8:00 a.m. on Sunday, August 14 or dismissal times different than 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 20

Junior Fair Feeder Calves and Beef Heifers have 2 options:

- 1. Arrive by Sunday morning, 8:00 a.m.
- **2.** Arrive Wednesday by 10:00 a.m.

# NO ARRIVALS ON MONDAY OR TUESDAY

Junior Fair Dairy Cattle released at 3:00 p.m. Tuesday, or must stay until Saturday at 7:00 p.m..

All Junior Fair sheep and goat exhibits may be removed between 2:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 20. All sheep and goats not removed by 3:00 p.m. must remain in place until 7:00 p.m.

All vehicles picking up animals must enter through Gate 1 on Pershing Road and exit through Gate 6.
