


What do Americans Think?



Climate Change in the American Mind:

- Nationally representative surveys of adults
- Conducted twice annually
- Started in 2008
- N = 1,000 per survey
- Used to track key indicators of public opinion
 - beliefs
 - behaviors
 - policy support



Base: Americans 18+. October, 2014.


Note: Respondents who either said they "don't know" or who did not answer the question are not included in the chart. As a result, percentages sum to less than 100%.

Most Ohioans Believe Global Warming Is Happening










It's Us

- But 28% believe it is caused mostly by natural changes in the environment -



Most Americans Think Global Warming Is a Relatively Distant Threat




How much do you think global warming will harm...? Base: Americans 18+ (n=1,275). October, 2014.

Many Ohioans Perceive Global Warming as a Relatively Distant Threat





About One in Ten Americans Knows That More Than 90% of Climate Scientists Have Concluded Human-Caused Global Warming Is Happening







Despite the modest levels of public engagement...


- There is still considerable public support for policy responses:

A Majority of Americans Say Global Warming Is Affecting Weather in the United States








How much do you trust or distrust the following as a source of information about global warming? (randomized)

Weathercasters have high trust and unparalleled access as climate educators




And they have great communication skills!

What do Meteorologists Think?

Preliminary Findings from a survey conducted last month

- 90% of current broadcast meteorologists are convinced that climate change is occurring
- Majorities are interested in presenting local impacts of climate change on-air (50%), online blogs (57%), or at community speaking events (64%)

Who do TV weathercasters trust as sources of information about climate change?









How big of an effort should the United States make to reduce global warming?


