
Swig Program in Jewish Studies and Social Justice



University Fellows become essential members of the Holocaust Center staff. Fellows mentor students, conduct research in the Tauber Holocaust Library and Archives, and create innovative lesson plans. The fellowship is a paid position with a commitment of 10 hours per week, October through June. Fellows may receive course credit upon completion.
