### In Memoriam – Micah David Bycel

It is with deep sadness that we announce the passing of Micah David Bycel, the older son of USF's Rabbi Lee Bycel, the Sinton Visiting Professor of Holocaust, Genocide, and Refugee Studies and faculty member of the Swig Program in Jewish Studies and Social Justice. Rabbi Bycel, a valued member of the USF community for well over a decade, has had a profound impact on the Swig JSSJ program and its faculty. He has been a mentor to Professor Hahn Tapper since 2007, as well as a mentor to and former teacher of Rabbi Camille Shira Angel since rabbinical school. Oren Kroll-Zeldin and Micah Bycel were very close lifelong friends. They grew up together in Los Angeles, where Oren's and Micah and Lee's families were very close.

Micah passed away on Aug. 27, 2022. A detailed obituary about this remarkable person can be found on Jweekly.

Micah's family is honoring his life through two organizations that were close to his heart:

# Jews and Indians on Turtle Island: Between **Colonialism and Justice**

Monday, Oct. 10 | 6:30–8 p.m. | Sukkah on Lone Mountain\* & Online

Part of the JSSJ "Open Doors" Sukkot Program + in celebration of Indigenous Peoples' Day

In his award-winning book, *The Jews' Indian: Colonialism, Pluralism, and* Belonging in America (2019), scholar David S. Koffman investigates the history of relations between American Jews and American Indians, both in the realm of cultural imagination and face-to-face encounters. In this talk Koffman will discuss this largely unknown piece of modern Jewish history within the context of both the longer, more complex entanglements between settlers and Indigenous peoples in American history, and contemporary Jewish efforts to grapple with the legacies of colonialism and advance the cause of justice on Turtle Island.

Immediately following Koffman's talk, USF Professor Kouslaa Kessler-Mata, an American Indian studies scholar, will moderate a Q&A discussion.
