

Nonviolence in the World's Religions: A Concise Introduction Swig JSSJ Director Aaron Hahn Tapper co-authored a chapter with activist Ilana Sumka for the book *Nonviolence in the World's Religions: A Concise* Introduction (Routledge, 2022). Titled "Judaisms and Nonviolence," the chapter provides a comprehensive examination of nonviolence in Jewish

traditions, from the Hebrew Bible and other ancient sacred texts to

contemporary examples of Jews arguing for nonviolence. The authors explain
