Communities nationwide are working to improve how they respond to individuals experiencing mental and behavioral health crises. Many are investing in new programs that view these crises as public health issues, rather than public safety concerns.

This innovative approach to crisis intervention relies on teams of behavioral health professionals, rather than law enforcement, to respond to people experiencing mental health emergencies. Directly dispatched via 911, response teams are specially trained to assist people in behavioral health crisis and connect them to community-based resources that will support their ongoing health and stability.

Researched and complied by community volunteers, the Directory of Alternative Crisis Response Programs highlights more than 100 municipalities committed to supporting people in need with non-police, unarmed emergency response teams.

This approach also allows 911 operators to quickly divert police-related calls that do not involve a risk to the public or to the caller's safety to the most appropriate resource available, thereby enhancing the efficiency of the police service by dispatching police to those events requiring a law enforcement response. Counselors divert about 80% of the calls that they receive from a police response. The majority of the calls are resolved over the phone, and about 14% of the time teams of two EMCOT clinicians respond in

community to those calls.
