

Morning Yoga (East Field)

Start your day of programs off right with a quick session of morning yoga led by one of our certified instructors!

9:00 - 10:30 AM

Campus Natural Reserve Hike (Meet at the Music Center Recital Hall)

Join UCSC Marine Biology student Sophia R. for a guided walk through the scenic Great Meadow, overlooking Monterey Bay. As a Field Inquiry Mentor, Sophia leads activities for firstyear students, encouraging participants to explore nature through observation and questions. The walk descends off-trail into the meadow and ends at the UCSC Arboretum's Australian Garden by 10:30 am. From there, you can return to the start or a nearby bus stop. Covering 0.7 miles on varied terrain, plus another 0.7 miles uphill if returning, participants should wear comfortable shoes, dress in layers, bring water, and prepare for sun.

10:00 - 11:00 AM

Outside of the Classroom: How Student Affairs Supports Your Student (Classroom Unit 1)

The presentation will show how student affairs staff support students beyond academics. It will cover key resources like residence life, counseling, career services, student organizations, and resource centers that promote personal growth, leadership, and belonging. Parents will learn how staff collaborate with students to create a supportive campus environment. The presentation will also explore students' psychological, social, and emotional development in college, offering insights and tips for families to help students build independence and resilience during this transition.

Undecided? Exploration strategies for finding a major (Kresge 3201)

This presentation offers insights into what it means to be "undecided" or "exploratory" and introduces resources and strategies to support students and their families in navigating the major exploration process at UCSC. We invite families to join us with any questions about exploring majors and discovering those that align with their goals and values.

CARE 101 (Namaste Lounge, College Nine)

CARE (Center for Advocacy, Resources & Empowerment) serves the UC Santa Cruz community by providing free and confidential support to those impacted by sexual assault, intimate partner/domestic violence, stalking, or sexual harassment. We offer prevention education training and work collaboratively with campus communities to create a culture of respect and empowerment. Come and learn about who we are and what we do!

Family Transitions (Multipurpose Room, College Nine/John R. Lewis)

This program will focus on helping parents support their students in navigating the transitions of coming to college. Learn about common challenges both students and family members experience and what resources are available for students' emotional health and well-being.

Summer Session 101: Discover Why Summer is the Perfect Optional Fourth Quarter (Merrill Academic, Room 102)*

Learn how summer can be the perfect time for your student to make degree progress, whether fulfilling major or general education requirements. We will explore the benefits of this optional "fourth quarter," including available financial aid options, helping your student stay on track or even get ahead in their academic journey. *Please note that this program will run from 10:15 to 10:45 am.

Your students can experience the world through enriching UCSC Global Learning programs as part of their undergraduate degree. Carpenter Lab Tours (Biomedical Sciences Building, Room 125)

The Carpenter lab studies RNA's role in regulating our immune responses. We are mainly focused on understanding the processes that lead to inflammation. During the visit, we can discuss how we can do this, for example, our use of CRISPR technology to understand the role that RNA plays in controlling inflammation. We can also show some of the cells we work with in culture. Many of these cells have been equipped with fluorescent tags, which are visible under the microscope, and we can demonstrate these.

Empowering Diversity: Programs and Services of Ethnic, Gender, and Sexuality Resource Centers at UC Santa Cruz (Classroom Unit 2)

This presentation will cover programs and services offered by UC Santa Cruz's Resource Centers, which support students from diverse backgrounds. Resource Centers include the African American Resource and Cultural Center, American Indian Resource Center, Asian American/Pacific Islander Resource Center, El Centro: Chicanx Latinx Resource Center, Lionel Cantú Queer Resource Center, and Women's Center. These centers provide leadership development, cultural celebrations, and services to help students thrive academically and personally. By fostering an inclusive environment, the centers empower students to explore their identities and build community on campus.

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

2:00-3:00 PM

Navigating UCSC Financial Aid for Degree Completion (Classroom Unit 1)

This session will include information on how to prepare for variable costs during your college career, maintaining financial aid eligibility, and unique circumstances that may arise that may warrant an appeal request. We recognize that for many families, this is the first time you may be pursuing higher education, and for those who have gone through this before, this presentation is an opportunity to learn more about how financial aid works here at UCSC and tools for supporting your student.

The Okinawa Memories Initiative: Experiential Learning Abroad (Humanities Lecture Hall)

Alan Christy will talk about an international public history project he directs that employs about 20 undergraduate students working with faculty and media professionals. The Okinawa Memories Initiative uses oral history, archival research, and public exhibition approaches to understanding the experience of living through the dramatic changes in Okinawa, from the devastation of the Battle of Okinawa through the construction of the largest US military base complex in Asia to Okinawa's current state as a burgeoning tech and climate research center.

Preparing Students for Career Success (Classroom Unit 2)

This session aims to equip families with the knowledge and resources necessary to assist their UCSC students in navigating the path to career success. We will provide an overview of the services, resources, and events we offer students to help them explore career paths and prepare for full-time jobs.

Home Away From Home: Housing at UCSC (Kresge 3105)

Discover how UCSC's campus housing creates a safe, supportive, and dynamic environment for students. This presentation will explore the diverse residential communities, amenities, and services that foster personal growth and academic success. Whether your student currently lives on-campus or is navigating the housing process for their second, third, or fourth year, gain valuable insights into how UCSC housing supports their evolving needs and enhances their college journey.

Let's Talk About Money (Krege 3201)*

What makes it so hard to talk about money? Join Tiffany Zachmeier (UCSC 2021) for a lively discussion about why students and parents have difficulty talking about money, how financial silence impacts our focus, health, and quality of life, and how rethinking our "money talk" can help us reduce financial stress and feel better about life.

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What Video Games Taught Me, and Why I Teach about Video Games (Multipurpose Room, College Nine / John R. Lewis) *

Soraya Murray is a visual culture scholar focused on art, film, and video games. In this talk, Murray discusses how she became an 'accidental' game scholar at a time when that wasn't even a real thing yet. She illuminates how video games can be an important tool for teaching visual analysis, imparting sophisticated themes around media and representation, and showing students how the imagined worlds games build can tell us about our own world. *Please note, this program will begin at 2:30 pm.

These methods, focused on collaboration and hands-on practice, lead to deeper, lasting learning. Students also engage in experiential, career-oriented opportunities across disciplines. Join us for an interactive session with Dr. Robin Dunkin, Associate Teaching Professor and Faculty Director of the Teaching and Learning Center, to explore teaching and learning at UC Santa Cruz.
