Writing an Effective Thesis Statement



-Make sure your thesis statement answers the question in the prompt!

-Restate the prompt's question in your answer



-Your thesis should answer **how** and **why**

-Utilize **"because"** to link your specific claim to a specific reason

Provide a Road Map

-Give readers a sense of how you'll develop your claim throughout the essay -Make sure your thesis addresses

"so what?" (why should readers care about this? how is it relevant to them?)

Make it Arguable

-Readers should be able to disagree with your claim if they want to

-If readers cannot disagree with your claim, it's a fact, and you'll want to revise it



Answer the prompt's question

Offer a factual statement (unless you're writing a report)

Move beyond a simple "yes" or "no" answer

Be vague or ambiguous

Use "because" or another linking word to show reasoning

Offer a claim without specific reasoning

Show readers how you'll develop your claim

Go off topic
