








Our goal was to identify opportunities for Belsize Library and the Winch to improve their services for impoverished youth by enhancing their community presence and increasing funds.







Expand Advertising for Room-Booking (n=91)


"Are you familiar with the library's offer to rent the main space out for events outside of normal operation hours?"

Plan a Membership/Loyalty Program for Belsize Library


"If there was a low-cost paid membership at the library, would you potentially be interested in joining?"



60% of respondents were potentially interested in joining a paid membership



Historical Narrative



Despite the problem of lack of space imposed on us by our temporary hut, we had a busy and successful Easter Playscheme. The emphasis was very much on "going out", whether it was impromptu dashes up to local parks and activity centres or rather more considered outings and holidays. A group of older Winch members went to North Wales for a week and as they were returning Sue and Jane took a group of girls on an adventure weekend in the Brecon Beacons where they learned the arts of archery, canceing and how to survive without a television for three days!

A larger than expected number of local kids were to be seen daily around the hut, either painting its outside walls or enacting the Cup Final on the fivea-side walls or ehacting the Cup ring of very grateful for the for the extra hard work from Jane, Fauline and Andy, without whom very little would have been possible.



VERY occasionally, a radical voluntary initiative in youth and community work succeeds in capturing the enthusiasm of the local area in which it is based. In Swiss Cottage, north London, The Winchformerly a pub called The Winchester Arms-has reached the stage where it is both accepted and supported by the community. The former Mayor of Camden, W. G. Budd, said of the Project, 'in recognition of the valuable work the voluntary Winchester Project has done for the youth of the area in providing amenities which would not otherwise be available for them, the London Borough of Camden and the Inner London Education Authority have both given financial support'.

The Project is currently embarking on a new phase of building work. The work will take a year to complete and a substantial sum of money has already been raised for this purpose. All five floors of The Winch are being completely refurbished, at a cost of £250,000, and when completed will accommodate the youth work force, an Intermediate Treatment scheme. educational day classes, play schemes and related activities.

After years of hassles, with plans and counter plans for the present site. Camden Council has now made a firm commitment to the future of the Project, with the provision of £150,000 towards building costs and a 30 year lease on the property. The rest of the money came from various sources-events organised by the management committee and the kids themselves raised some £25,000; with the remainder coming from ILEA and various Trusts.

The decision by Camden Council to support the Project can be viewed as a success for the efforts of the staff team: notably Graham Good, who has been involved in

At least 14 months of plumbing. plastering, wiring and general building work followed, as volunteers of all ages strove to build their own club. A management committee comprising young people and adults was established and in May 1973 the building was opened on a limited basis. Leaflets were distributed around local housing estates, visits to the

Senior Clubs. But none with the intensity of the Football Club. which had a number of teams playing matches throughout the Council with a grant for building vear-in 1977 the under-21 team even went on a tour of Belgium The basic principle of The Winch and Holland.

One of the most popular activities has been the seven-daya-week playscheme, which runs for the duration of the summer holiday, Established in 1973, the playscheme offered everything camping, football and drama. The summer festivities have always culminated in a two-day Community Festival. These have included appearances by well known musical and theatrical artistes, together with local Century Steel and an all male band called Girl!

Alongside the youth provision grew a community-based school for referrals in a one mile catch-Links with a local law centre led to the setting up of a regular advice ment area of Swiss Cottage. These
