

Abstract: This document contains a brochure outlining the WaSH-UP Programme. It is an innovative program currently being operated in South Africa, specifically in the informal settlement of Langrug in the Stellenbosch municipality. This initiative is a unique approach as it involves the community to a much greater degree. In doing this, the community has a much greater sense of responsibility and ownership of facilities built and maintained through this programme. This is a programme that has the potential to be replicated throughout the world in informal settlements/poverty stricken urban areas. 

### Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Upgrading Programme

#### What is WaSH-UP?

WaSH-UP, or Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Upgrading Programme, is an innovative solution to common health problems in urban informal settlements. It begins with the creation of a WaSH-UP facility created and operated by the community members. These facilities include access to important WaSH appliances such as sinks, laundry areas, toilets, and showers. Beyond the physical facilities, it becomes a key social space for community health, education and wellbeing development.

WaSH-UP is driven by a **collaborative partnership** between **regional NGOs** with connections to informal settlements, **local government agencies**, and a **university in the United States** that engages students and faculty in a shared learning and supporting role.

# Why WaSH-UP?

#### A WaSH Crisis in South Africa

- Access to basic sanitation facilities has been identified as a human right
- Limited health and wellness education leads to increased prevalence of disease

WaSH-UP **provides opportunities** for community members to address health and well-being issues such as **grey water management**, **early childhood development support**, **HIV/AIDS**, **teen pregnancy**, **disease**, **alcoholism**, **etc**.
